## EDUCATIONAL TUMBLER SERIES

### HEAVY VINE TUMBLER

The tumbler that we feature in this article is actually a part of the Heavy Vine pattern tumble up or night set. We show the complete set in photo #2. We believe that you will be able to detect the pattern better in that photo. Marigold is the only color that has been found in any of the Heavy Vine pieces.

Heavy Vine is a rather simple pattern. The tumbler contains six panels, actually forming a six sided shape. Each of the panels contains 3 blocks. The top block is not square. It curves upward toward the rim. The simple curving vine with small pointed leaves circles the tumbler through the second row of blocks. The base is six sided. The bottom of the base has been factory ground and polished. A six petal flower like figure is impressed into the center of the underside. Bob Smith of Boston, MA. has one of the regular Heavy Vine tumblers that is somewhat lighter marigold tumbler from the tumble up set. Everything else is exactly

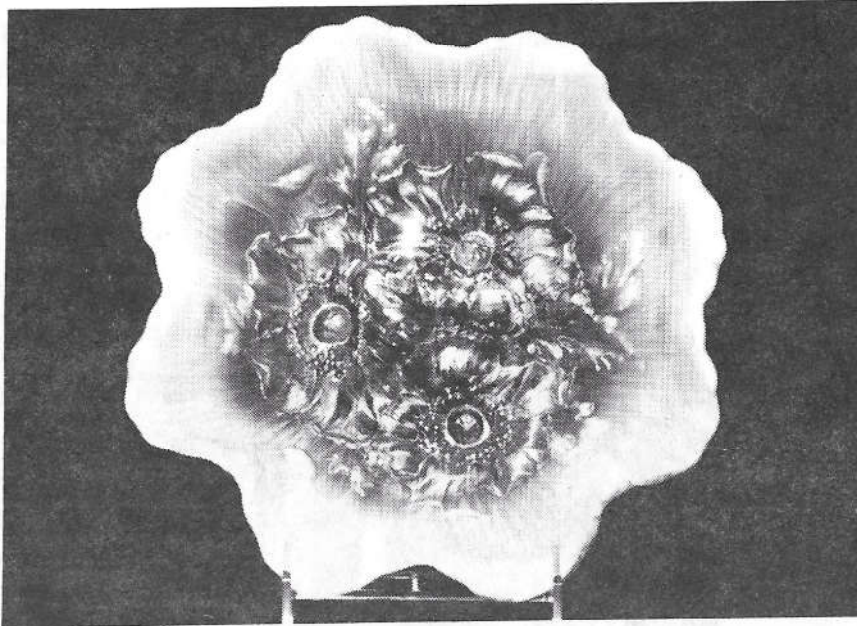
the same. It has been our experience that both the tumbler and tumble up sets are quite rare in this pattern.

Mrs. Hartung shows the Heavy Vine pattern in her book #9 on page 93 which features the atomizer. William Heacock, in his Collecting Glass Book volume #1 on page 99 illustrates the Heavy Vine cologne, powder box and atomizer. Like most of the collectors and authors, he considered this pattern as a product from Czechoslovakia.

This pattern was made in many different pieces. Our personal favorite is the little shot glass. It is only 2½" inches high and has super color and iridescence. It is a little cutie. More on the Heavy Vine shot glass in a future Lincoln Land Miniature series article.

## AQUA OPAL POPPY SHOW

This is one of those carnival glass super stars that should be on every collector's Christmas wish list. Unfortunately, their rarity rules out most collectors from ever seeing one, but they do exist. Carl Burn's Northwood Carnival Glass book states that only one bowl and one plate are known in Aqua Opal. So this bowl is possibly only the second one to surface to our knowledge. Yes, we are sure there are others out there somewhere just waiting to be found. Something this pretty had to be made in greater numbers than one or two. *Unless*, these were test pieces made for George Mortimer, of the Mortimer Glass Company.

Who is George Mortimer and what was his connection to Aqua Opal glass? For the answers to these mysteries you are invited to read Chapter 2 of William Heacock's Collecting Glass, volume 3, and also read Carl Burn's interesting discussion on "Northwood's Mysterious Aqua Opalescent" in his Northwood Glass book. Both books are still available and a must for any serious glass collector.

This pattern and the similar Rose Show pattern are both attributed to Harry Northwood by color association only. None are signed (N) and none show up in the old glass advertisements with other known Northwood glass. But the above articles will prevail upon most readers that George Mortimer, a glass entrepreneur, was instrumental for not only the aqua opal color, but the Rose Show and Poppy Show moulds, were also under his control. His company didn't make the glassware itself but was a glass jobber. He contracted with other companies such as Northwood to manufacture the glass. He was fully involved with glass making having been associated with Jefferson, Northwood and Fenton Glass companies and independently in 1908 as the Mortimer Glass Company.

So we wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, and keep checking out the antique malls. The next Poppy Show bowl may be in the next booth.

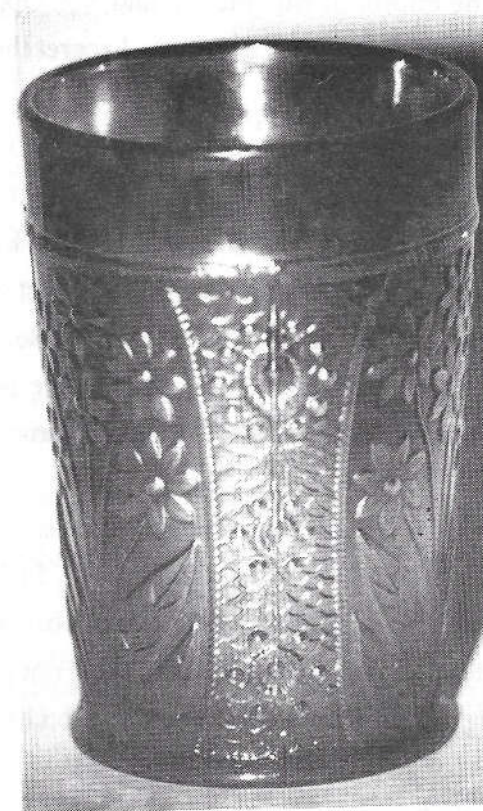
## MY SATISFYING OVERDUE VACATION

powder blue (\$15).

All the way home, I thought about the odd colored tumbler I found for \$76 and decided to take it to my Great Lakes Carnival Glass club's Glass Bash in November and show it around to find out what this color was called. November 1st, I arrived at the "Glass Bash" and went to Tom Burns' room (4 doors from mine). I asked Tom what color it was as I unwrapped this tumbler, having only the top uncovered Tom looked at me as if saying, "it's marigold, why do you have to ask?" But when he saw the bottom and the glass color, his facial expression changed radically and he said "that's the only known Boquet tumbler in Persian Blue, who knows what it's worth!! That made my vacation extremely satisfying. Antiquing, eating Lobster, visiting ex-relatives and finding rare glass!!!

## THE CARNIVAL MARKETPLACE

Being an open minded person, I am usually receptive to constructive feedback and criticism. I do appreciate the efforts of Mr. Pickup and Mr. Oppenlander in voicing their opposing viewpoints (October 96 HOACGA bulletin). I regret they did not like the content of my article, "Two Carnival Markets".

Most of my articles are written for pleasure and human interest. I attempt to introduce Carnival Glass topics which are innovative and unique. Yes, I do incorporate some dry humor on occasion. My primary goal in writing articles is to assist collectors in understanding the carnival glass market and to make the hobby more enjoyable. A solid understanding of the carnival glass market is essential if collectors are to make prudent buying and selling decisions involving glassware. Individual success stories in carnival collecting translate into future growth for the hobby.

The only exception I take to the comments made by Mr. Pickup and Mr. Oppenlander was the reference that I placed "people" into two categories of collectors. In reviewing my articles, I contend I made reference to carnival glassware and not people, though some might feel otherwise. I see nothing wrong with attending an auction or convention that sells only expensive glassware or one that sells only lower priced glassware. There are opportunities to socialize at either of the two functions. Certainly, a collector could participate in both. I feel the main underlying point of my article was not understood by Mr. Pickup and Mr. Oppenlander.

The Focus of the article "Two Carnival Markets" is not about social relationships in the carnival hobby. The focus of the article is about a better way to market carnival glassware for the benefit of everyone - sellers and buyers. For the hobby to grow, of course we need new members. But we also need something else, which is efficiency and integrity in the carnival glass market. I stand by my position - I do not like carnival auctions where the supply of glass is excessive. This may result in glass being acquired at less than fair market

value. I see this happening when close to 500 pieces of glass are sold in one weekend. What happens when you have 3 or 4 auctions scheduled in one month selling this quantity of glass? It does not matter if it is expensive or inexpensive glassware. When supply exceeds demand, prices fall. The glass consignor suffers and possibly the reputation of the auction company as well. This was my first rationale for advocating the splitting of glassware in the carnival marketplace. Putting less of any commodity on the auction block (including glassware) at one time and in one geographic location improves auction results. Having more auctions geographically dispersed allows more people to participate in the auction process. I feel glass prices and collector demand will improve under this scenario. My second purpose, was to suggest that placing glassware into two groups would attract buyers who do not normally attend glass conventions. On several occasions, I have heard that lower priced carnival sells better at "country" or local auction houses. If I were a seller of lower priced glassware, I might consider marketing some glassware this way. Now, for the other side of the coin. Individuals investing large sums of money in antiques or art for investment purposes want a formal and reliable marketplace. We should be able to accommodate this growing need by sponsoring a few specialized auctions each year. Specialized auctions do exist for high priced art pottery, antique furniture and other forms of American art and folk art. I have said enough regarding this matter. I'm not sure the HOACGA bulletin is the right place for further debate concerning carnival glass markets. I do extend an invitation to Mr. Pickup and Mr. Oppenlander to join me in a round table discussion during the 1997 HOACGA convention to discuss these "marketing" issues further. Everyone is welcome to attend and participate. Possibly through our combined efforts, we can identify better ways to promote the carnival glass hobby. Who knows, Mr. Pickup and Mr. Oppenlander and myself might even attend the Ice Cream Social together.

## ANATOMY OF AN AUCTION

I have read, with more than a bit of interest, Gerald Thomas' article calling for a "separation of the glasses". The printed responses, and some subsequent backward tap dancing were also interesting. I believe that lost in the shuffle is a knowledge of just what is an auction. My definition - An auction is a sale by competitive bidding of anything and everything that someone wants to get rid of, and any auctioneer worth his/her salt will cry out over anything given for sale, and the sooner the better, which means sell it all at one time and go on to the next batch of anything and everything.

But, as implied by some, there might be a reason for "separation of the glasses", that being "good" glass auctions and "common" glass auctions. Is it practical? I don't think so, and I believe the following can explain this reasoning.

The first carnival glass auction Libby and I attended was a Burns auction during November, 1989 in Cleveland. We were auction veterans, but this was a new experience for us. What an eye-opener, but we (read "I was hooked") were hooked on carnival glass and, regardless of the auction atmosphere and auctioneer's attitude, we kept after it and joined many clubs on the way. It was three years before we had the courage to bid over \$1,000 for a piece of carnival glass and, in the meantime, we had over 300 pieces in the house.

Being a technical sort of person, I began to question the structure of these auctions we were attending. It was interesting to see who was bidding on what glass and how many pieces certain people were buying. Before long, out came my fingers, toes and calculator, all very reliable counting devices. I totaled the selling prices, divided by the number of lots sold to get an average selling price per lot, and then established price range categories just to see if these auctions had any consistency to them. In the early years it didn't make any difference who the auctioneer was (Burns, Cooper, Seeck, Woody) the auctions we attended generally reflected 30%-40% selling \$250 or more and 60%-70% selling below \$250, except, of course, for the few and far in between big bucks collections that sold. The auctions I have attended during 1996 generally have a fairly decent pattern (except for the Spangler auction which doesn't need to be discussed being one of those few and far between big bucks auctions).

I would first classify auctions as national, regional and local (no intention of stepping on anyone's toes). National auctions do not have a fixed base for sale and have three categories - major club convention (ACGA, HOACGA, ICGA & Lincoln Land), sectional club conventions (Florida, Keystone, Texas, etc.), and individual / consignment auctions by a major auctioneer. Regional auctions are conducted in a fixed base auction house (Riverbend, Reichel, etc.), and local auctions at the nearby county fairgrounds. I've seen some 400 piece collections sell at fairgrounds and the variety was just as good as at a major or regional auction.

The following data is from major and regional auctions I have personally attended during 1996. Please remember that my fingers and toes are only so accurate and there is some small error in this data, but only minor.

The first bit of information is that major auctions are all fairly consistent in that the above three major auctioneers depend heavily on "common" glass to fill out their program. Glass selling under \$250 / lot ranges from 45.7% to 69.1% and averaging 61.3% for the nine major auctions, just what it's been averaging for the past six years. Once again telling us that most of our carnival glass is "common" glass and it is purchased by many different people, otherwise there would be a lot of "no sales" in the final catalog.

The nine major auctions can be further dissected. Burns 1 compares favorably with Cooper 8, both having primary and secondary consignors for the auctions. The Seeck 6 auction also had primary and secondary consignors and was the better of the three auctions, but still had 57.1% common glass. Another note of interest is that 47% of the in-house bidders at Seeck 6 bought glass under \$100 / lot and nine of those bidders buying that \$100 glass also bought \$1,000+ glass.

I must say something about the Cooper data analyzed. For those who have never been to a Cooper-Albrecht auction, their two auctions per year are really four auctions. Friday night is a totally different animal than is Saturday. The data processed above in each case of Cooper 8 & 9 is for the Saturday sessions. Additionally for Cooper 9, 39% of the 121 in-house bidders bought items at less than \$100 and 40% of those people also bought "top end" glass. Also, 23% of the in-house bidders bought nothing but glass less than \$100. There were also 90 absentee bidders with 21% of them buying below \$100 glass. Definitely a full spectrum audience.

Burns 2 & 3 are major convention auctions, both top loaded with big ticket items from more than one consignor but both still requiring half of the auction to be "common" glass in order to make it interesting for everyone at the convention. I don't really believe that, but I'll say it anyway. My idea of a convention is companionship, chitchat, learning more about carnival glass, room hopping, excellent seminars, and good food. There are plenty of good auctions around the country each year without wasting convention time on one. Right now

it's interesting to watch the major clubs trying to out-auction each other and they are really staying on a level playing field, (see Burns 2 & 3). The fierce competition just might prove to be disastrous. What collector in his right mind is going to let an auctioneer come into the house, pack up 160 pieces of "top end" glass and leave behind 240 pieces of "common" glass?

Burns 4 and Seeck 5 are sectional convention auctions and are very, very similar. There is no difference between the two auctioneers for this level of auction and they both required over 50% "common" glass to give the auction some substance.

Seeck 7 was a single collector sale and this, in my opinion, is typical of the average collection of carnival glass, having both "top end" and "common" glass and the collector enjoying every bit of it. This auction was a proper auction in that there were no add-ins to make it look better, and the auction was still well attended with nearly 100 in-house bidders and an unknown number of absentees.

Only a very small percentage of collections are primarily "top end" glass. Nearly all collections are similar to that sold at Seeck 7. I've had the pleasure of seeing three major collections and I expect to visit and see more if I can get around to some invitations I have.

The Riverbend 10 auction is typical of the fixed base auctions I have attended. I've never been to a Reichel auction so I can't really classify those, but they are fixed base auctions. However, the fur flies here just like at a major auction and the most recent Riverbend auction (October 26) had the two top pieces sell to two different bidders., both on the telephone at bidding time for those pieces. And therein is the solution for a collector who doesn't want to sit through 60% "common" glass. Stay home and bid over the phone or just send in an absentee bid high enough to ensure getting the one or two pieces of interest.

I recently attended a two day household auction at the Wayne County fairgrounds in Wooster, Ohio. There were all totaled 81 pieces of carnival glass in that sale. Two pieces sold over \$1000 and seven other pieces sold over \$250 with the remainder selling in the less than \$249 / lot categories, a ratio comparable to a regional auction.

Having crunched the above data, and knowing that 1996 was no different than past years, it is my opinion that carnival glass auctions are going to truck on along as they have been in the past. Today's 30+ major auctions are presently successful at 300 to 400 lots for sale, and there's one thing for sure, they all can't be a Spangler auction. Consignors still need to provide a variety of glass to an auctioneer and the auctioneer should still have an obligation to sell everything as in the case of a single collector auction similar to Seeck 7. That, as I see it, makes it interesting for everyone, not just a very minor select few... and this hobby will continue to prosper.

## AUCTIONEER'S "ETIQUETTE" - YOUR OPINION

I'd like to get fellow "seekers" opinions on what my husband and I call "the auction from hell." We're carnival glass collectors in Texas, and saw an ad for a two-day estate auction conducted by Bailey Davis of Muskogee OK. The ad, in tiny print, listed in detail carnival pattern names of over 300 pieces of glass. At the end of the lengthy listing was printed one sentence saying that other household and miscellaneous items would also be included. So we grabbed another couple, who are new carnival glass collectors, left home about 5 AM, and set off on a three hour drive... with the thrill of the hunt coursing through our veins. Upon arrival we found a nice assortment of glass, a case with about 8 shelves of darker carnival and 3 long tables full of marigold. The majority of the buyers were "carnival" folk... one that we were acquainted with had driven five hours to get there. These were knowledgeable buyers and thus the bids were reasonable - not outrageous. My friends and I settled back for a wonderful time of bidding for treasures. Then, it happened. The auctioneer, who was not "carnival" knowledgeable, would auction a couple of pieces and then switch to furniture and household items. By household items, I'm talking wicker baskets full of old sewing remnants and tins of old used watercolor paints. As the day wore on, the auctioneer would bring up fewer pieces of carnival and more and more of the "misc. household items." By the middle of the afternoon, the "crowd was getting nasty." When he began to hear vocal grumbling, we all received a brief lecture on his past bad experiences of letting the crowd control what he auctioned. He'd learned his lesson and wasn't going to have that happen again.

To bring this long story to a close, by 6 PM he'd chosen to auction only about 25 percent of the carnival. And we were some tired, frustrated carnival buyers. We wondered... did this guy have a friend that he knew wasn't coming until the next day, and he was saving the best for him? Or because he had a large inventory of furniture and household items from this and other past estates, we was determined because he had a big crowd that this was the time to try to get rid of it?

So, for those who have been doing this for a number of years (or any of our wonderful carnival glass auctioneers), would you share experiences of what is considered good "etiquette" for an auctioneer? When there's a two-day sale (with no agenda of what is to be sold when), is it unreasonable for the buyers to expect that as much as possible will be sold the first day, and what's left will be sold the second (the first-come-first-served philosophy)? I could have even accepted the glass being arbitrarily divided in half so that about the same amount sold each day. As it was, we felt we were drawn into a bait-and-switch tactic.

If a similar situation presents itself in the future, would it be appropriate to call the auctioneer in advance and ask what the guidelines will be? We did learn a few lessons:

- 1.) What you see at an auction is not necessarily what you get, and
- 2.) to never take a good auctioneer for granted.

## THE STRANGE & MYSTERIOUS LEGACY OF THE OLD PURPLE BOWL

Back around 1912, in the small, remote northern Maine town of Fort Fairfield, there was a general store called "Fritz's". One day a young man named Warren Kilcollins walked into this store and purchased a pretty, iridescent purple glass bowl to give to his mother, Pheobe. Warren Kilcollins was my Grandfather. The purple bowl remained with Pheobe Kilcollins for many years, until she gave it to her Granddaughter, Edna, in the early 1940's. Edna Kilcollins had only been married to Richard Burns for a few years. With two toddling daughters to feed and clothe, and the country still struggling with the effects of the Great Depression, times were pretty hard. There was little money for frills. It was thought that the purple bowl would add a little color to their otherwise Spartan surroundings. Their third child, a son, was born in 1948, and the world forever changed. At least, I like to think so.

My father was a Minister and we moved around quite a bit while I was growing up. The purple bowl went with us and became very well travelled. It visited almost every state east of the Mississippi River! We referred to it as "Grammie Pheobe's Old Purple Bowl". It became a catchall for paper clips, pencils, car keys, and just about everything else. I seem to recall that we may even have fed the dog out of it once or twice, but I can't be sure.

My parents always had an interest in history and a love for things old. Thus, after my father's retirement, in the late 1960's, they decided to open a small Antique Shop. Naturally one of their first curiosities was about the old purple bowl. They knew it was, by this time, rather old, but that's about all. Then came a fateful day and things started to get weird. While browsing through one of their first Flea markets, my mother spotted a table that contained several pieces of glass that looked very much like the old purple bowl. Approaching the table, mom and dad noticed a man whom appeared to be in the process of purchasing one of these pieces of glass. As they began examining the glass, this man asked them if they too collected carnival glass. My father replied that, up until that moment, they had not even known that it was called that, but that they did have a piece of it at home. As it turned out,

this man actually collected this stuff, and he lived only about 4 miles from my parents. He was already quite well known in the hobby and I'm sure that there are those among you who remember him well. His name was John Stewart. Before they left, my parents had received a gracious invitation to visit his home and see his carnival collection.

I had just turned 21 at the time. In the previous few years, I had managed to successfully evolve into what you would probably call a typical, late 60's "freaked out, long-haired hippie". My buddy, Keith, and I, were trying to make a go of a small photography studio located in a rather "Bohemian" neighborhood which was comprised of coffee houses, record shops, "head shops" and psychedelic boutiques. On the night that, unbeknownst to me, my parents were to visit John, I was in the darkroom engaged in the rather boring task of developing and printing passport photos for some of day's customers. I arrived home about 9:00 PM. Mom and Dad returned home about an hour later. They had a stack of books in their arms and a strange, glazed and somewhat frightening look in their eyes. They spent the next couple of hours in what seemed a near frantic scan of the books and conversing excitedly in a strange sort of gibberish. I couldn't make out most of it, but I did manage to pick out a few words that sounded something like, "iridescence", "marigold", "Northwood", "Millersburg", and strange phrases like, "N in a circle". But, most of it seemed unintelligible. It was a little unnerving so I went to bed.

Over the next few weeks things got progressively worse. Pieces of the strange glass that looked like "Grammie Pheobe's old purple bowl" began appearing all over the house, seemingly out of nowhere. Mom and Dad's behavior became more and more erratic. They spent less and less time at home, often returning late with their arms full of bags and boxes, and with that strange, frightening look in their eyes. More and more of the strange glass appeared. The conversations in the weird gibberish continued. I began to check the basement for any signs of "pods".

Then, one evening, something terrible happened. I was innocently watching television when, without even realizing it, I found myself holding one of the strange pieces of glass. It

really was rather pretty. The design was interesting and the colors quite intriguing. I began to wonder how and when it had been made and by whom. Almost subconsciously I ran my fingers along the edge in a search for any chips. As I turned to hold it to the light, to check for cracks, I suddenly became aware that I was not alone. My parents had returned and were standing in the doorway. They had that strange, frightening look in their eyes, only now it was transfixed directly upon me! From the bag in her arms, my mother produced another piece of the glass and started towards me. Horrified, I back into the corner as the truth dawned. This was some kind of alien plot and I had been the target of it all along! Determined to sell myself dearly, I informed them in no uncertain terms that I was on to their scheme. I warned them not to try anything. I raised my hands to defend myself, only to discover that I was still clutching the strange piece of glass. Light from the lamp streamed through it, projecting dazzling beams of color all around me. I slumped, trembling, back into the chair. I found that I couldn't take my eyes off of the piece of glass now cradled in my lap. I don't know how long I sat there like that. The next thing I remember was my father standing over me, his hand resting on my shoulder. "It's all right, son", he said. "It's over. You're one of us now."

That's how it all began for me, over 27 years ago. John Stewart, who passed away over 10 years ago, became one of my best friends and my "Carnival Mentor". I think of him often. My parents are both gone now too, but "Grammie Pheobe's old purple bowl" is still around. John had identified it, on that fateful night, as an amethyst Millersburg Fleur Di Lis bowl. Over the years, a collection of several hundred pieces grew up around it. When my mother's collection was auctioned, in 1988, the bowl was not included in the sale. In the 84 years that it has been in our family, through all its travels and trails, it has not received so much as a scratch! My sister, Susan, owns it now and it sits proudly on the center shelf of her living room "what-not". During the last few years, a number of other pieces of the glass have mysteriously appeared around it. The last time I visited her, the large, Victorian "what-not" was full. I arrived to find her sitting in her recliner, her gaze fixed upon "Grammie Pheobe's old purple bowl". I walked over and placed my hand gently on her shoulder. "It's all right, Sue", I said. "It's over. You're one of us now."

- \* The Convention offers members an opportunity to meet new collectors, renew old friendships and enjoy discussing carnival glass with other knowledgeable collectors.
- \* A banquet is held with a Carnival Collector as our Speaker.
- \* A Hospitality time is provided by the club. This is a time of relaxation and visiting with other members.

It takes the support of all collectors and members to promote the hobby in order that its growth and expansion can continue.

In order to obtain our objective, the members must financially support the organization. The Heart of America Carnival Glass Association receives its financial support through the Annual Membership dues and the sale of the following.

\* **Membership Dues** - \$25.00 per year - U.S. & Canada. \$40.00 per year for Foreign. The Membership Year is from the date of joining to one year later. Dues are set by the Board of Directors to support the publication of the monthly bulletin, typing, printing and mailing.

## SEECK AUCTIONS UPDATE
