BEADED ACANTHUS & POINSETTA

Here we have two Imperial Glass Company patterns that share a common thread. Both of these attractive designs were made in milk pitchers only. Why other shapes were not made in either of these two patterns is our loss today. Imperial Glass Co. provided us with many milk pitchers. In fact, they seemed to have dominated the field in this shape.

They range from the fairly common marigold Star Medallion to spectacular purple milk pitchers such as Four-Seventy-Four and Fieldflower. That is not to say that other purple pitchers, like the Windmill and Poinsetta are not held in very high esteem. We arrived home from a long past auction with our purple Windmill and after giving it a good scrubbing, we were thrilled with its wild colors.

Now let's look at the Beaded Acanthus. This is a pattern that is not seen that often and may be considered a sleeper. Apparently, smoke and marigold are the only colors that are known to exist. The possibility that green and purple (amethyst) also exist would only be speculation on our part. Either color would certainly be



treasured and we would think that if the do exist, they would certainly have surfaced by now.

A nice dark marigold is the most often found color but not in the numbers that you would expect. Checking our past auction results from 1983 through 1996, in the last fourteen years only eight marigold pitchers have been sold. Compare that record to the popular marigold Poinsetta with about twenty five changing hands in auctions, and many can be found in the antique malls. That gives us a relative ratio of three or four to one.

There are none listed as being sold in smoke. We have been told that they do exist, but we cannot recall actually seeing one ourselves. The price guides only reflect a \$75 difference in prices between marigold and smoke. A somewhat unrealistic price difference considering the absence of its availability. This might be a classic example of supply and demand. With little demand, very few appear on the market. The help increase the demand, we would be delighted to add one to our modest collection at the prices quoted in the guides. Got one?

JERRY AND CAROL CURTIS

If you attend our HOACGA conventions, you have probably become acquainted with this interesting couple. They have assisted the club by helping with the judging of the room displays, and by presenting an educational program at our 1990 convention. The HOACGA Board recently asked them if they would share their Carnival Glass experiences:

"We are honored that you have asked us for our story. Carol and I first became interested in Carnival Glass in about 1983. Up to that point in time, we were more into depression era glass, pottery and other glassware. Both Carol and I had our real estate licences, and on one occasion, Carol had been contacted to list a piece of property. It was not in a very safe part of town, so I accompanied her to look the property over. We met the selling party who had been renting the property out to a relative, and discovered a house full of antiques, glassware and junk. Carol inquired about an old cake stand, and the lady told her she did not know yet what she wanted to sell, but would let her know later. She called Carol later that night and told her she had gotten everything out of that house that she wanted and Carol could help herself to the cake stand and whatever else she might want. She added whatever we did not want was going to the junkyard. We returned the next day and hauled several pickup loads of all sorts of glassware out of the house... among which was three pieces of Carnival Glass... two vases and one green Grape & Cable plate. She informed Carol what it was and eventually brought over an old Bill Edwards Price Guide and helped us identify the piece. When we saw the value of that plate versus some of the depression era glassware we collected, plus the beauty of the iridized plate versus the rather plain look of depression glass, we quickly made up our minds that that's what we wanted to collect.

We have not limited our collection to any particular color, pattern, shape or manufacturer. From the "git-go", we have truly like it all. Those of you who know Carol and me, also know that our "drummer" leads us down various avenues. Our tastes in Carnival Glass encompasses all facets of the hobby. Sure, we like the super rarities, and along the way, we have amassed a few of those. We like the color "red", and have around twenty pieces in our collection. If there were any one thing that really stirs our interests, I would say it would be the strange or unusual pieces, the rare or seldom seen pieces, and miniature and novelty pieces. I, more so than Carol, have an affinity with the old Carnival Glass Kerosene and Electric Lamps. If I

were to have to select a particular favorite, it would have to be our Farmyard Bowl, probably because it kindles fond boyhood memories of life on the farm. Carol likes the Holly pattern, and one of her favorites is one in a rare moonstone glass which we purchased at a Britt auction. In characterizing our collection, I would have to say it still follows closely the title of an educational program we did at HOACGA in 1990. It is really a "Heinz 57 Variety" Carnival collection. As for pieces we would like to add... like others, our tastes most usually outweigh our pocketbooks. If price and availability were no concern, I would surely like to add to our collection a People's Vase and Carol would like to have one of each color of the Fenton Butterfly Ornament. We both would also like to have a Cleveland Memorial astray.

In our collecting, we have had many great Carnival "finds". Perhaps one of the most interesting was the discovery of the Marigold Millersburg Trefoil Fine Cut Chop Plate in a little flea market in Florida. We had planned an anniversary trip to that area and had asked John & Lucile Britt of some good hunting areas along the way. John told us of one flea market in particular where he had had some good finds. We went to the flea market, and I spied the chop plate on an old dish drainboard with a lot of other types of plates and bowls. I asked to see the piece and as I was looking it over, Carol strolled up, looked at the piece, turned up her nose, as she said "English" and walked away. However, something clicked in my mind as I looked it over, and Carol was not altogether happy with me as I paid the lady her \$9.16 asking price. As it turned out, it is the only one known or reported at this time, and according to Bill Edwards, worth several thousands of dollars!

Carol and I both attended High School together at Eufaula, Oklahoma. I was a couple of grades ahead of her, and we were never romantically involved during our school years. I did, however, work for her Mon and Dad at their newly opened Tastee Freeze. When I graduated from high school, I did what almost every young man did at the time, I joined the Army. Carol and I went our separate ways, married and had families, and never saw each other again for over twenty-two years, when I, divorced father rearing two teenage daughters, returned for my High School Class Reunion. There I became reacquainted with Carol, a recently widowed mother, also with a teenage son and daughter. We were married in 1981 and my job as an Area Manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company

moved us from Stilwater to Muskogee, where we eventually discovered our love for Carnival Glass. We heard from an antique dealer of the annual HOACGA convention and attended our first convention in 1987. She (the antique dealer) told us to take glass to the show and sell and to be sure to have a room display. I will never forget our very first display. We were really going to show our very best Carnival Glass, and Carol had the previous year, for my birthday, given me a Marigold Question Marks compote. We centered our theme on that... preparing a colorful poster with question marks (?) all over it, for we had so many questions about the beautiful glass. We met and fell in love with John and Lucile Britt and of course, Bob and Rosa Grissom. They took us under their collective wings and answered all of our many questions with patience and understanding. Wilbur and Bernice Bell enlisted our help in preparing for the banquet. And, what a memorable banquet it was. There, for the first time, we heard one of the

Like most couples who are new to our fascinating Carnival Glass hobby, Jo Ann and I had at first purchased just about any piece of glass that was iridized, available and within our budget. After a couple of years, we decided that it would be wise if I would "specialize" in some color, shape, pattern or manufacturer. By doing this, I would have an opportunity to become fairly knowledgeable of a specific area of Carnival Glass.

As a small child, I always looked forward in the springtime to the day when the strawberries would become ripe. I loved to pick the bright, sweet red berries... eating my fill of them before taking some into the house.


One day while thinking just where to "specialize", I had an inspiration: Why not pick strawberries? So, I chose the Northwood Strawberry pattern and decided to initially limit my quest to bowls. There was some concern at that time that there might be a relatively small number of pieces in my special collection. If I had one bowl of each of the known colors, I might have only 8 to 10 bowls.

It was not too long before it became obvious that I could have a fairly sizeable collection of Strawberry bowls. The bowls come in at least eight available colors. Each of these can be found in two different edge types (pie crust and ruffled). All of the colors and edge types were probably made with either a basketweave or a smooth back. The bowls were also made in a stippled and a non-stippled pattern. (The stippled ones have three narrow rings around the edge of the pattern and they are more difficult to find.) If I could ever find and obtain one each of all the color, edge type, back pattern and design combinations, I would have as many as 64 different Northwood Strawberry bowls.


Northwood also made another variation of their Strawberry pattern adding a small blossom to the central design. This design has come to be known as "Wild Strawberry". No one is sure how many colors, edge type or back pattern combinations might have been made in Wild Strawberry.

In the future, should I decide to expand my Strawberry collection beyond bowls, there would be quite a number of plates in this pattern including those with a hand gripped shape.




NORTHWOOD STRAWBERRY

THOSE LITTLE PIECES OF GLASS

Is bigger better? Not always. I wrote this article after reading an investment newsletter which discussed the growing popularity of leisure activities - resorts, casinos, cruise lines, golf courses and retirement communities. Regardless of age or occupation, we all enjoy leisure time. I suspect the desire for easy, care free living will not only influence how and where retires live, but will also influence glass collecting habits as well.

How do changing life-styles and demographics affect carnival glass collecting? My thoughts on this subject are that maybe smaller, focused collections are better than larger, extensive collections. A focused collection as I see it should encompass fewer glass pieces and should consist only of specific glass patterns, shapes or small glass rarities. I want to emphasize the word "small" here. The reason for collecting small glassware pieces can best be explained this way. It mainly has to do with a big shift in demographics. The "baby boomers," people born in the 1950's are well on their way towards attaining retirement age. I'm not convinced that the majority of these folks want to retire on a farm, feed the critters and maintain a six bedroom house filled with furniture, antiques, collectibles or carnival for that matter. Most people, I believe, probably want to retire in a warm climate, enjoy convenient, affordable housing and are not interested in extensive yard work or house cleaning. Sound familiar? If a small, manageable collection of some truly wonderful glass sounds appealing to you, then below are a few suggestions:

A collection of miniature compotes - Embossed Scroll, Leaf and Little Flowers, Boutonniere, Miniature Blackberry and Wheat patterns.

Tumbler collections - Assemble a collection of tumblers made by only one manufacturer, Fenton, Millersburg or Northwood, not ALL of them combined.

Spittoons - Inverted Strawberry, Hobnail Swirl, Hobnail, Grape & Cable, and Feather and Heart (if you can find one). Also there are several contemporary spittoons, mostly convention souvenirs gaining popularity.

Small plates - Usually six or seven inches in diameter. Several exceptional patterns and colors exist in this category.

Toothpick holders, Small Open Edge baskets, swans, hat pins and iridized buttons. All very small, easy to display and affordable

I could go on, but the point here is that collections of the type identified above do offer appeal simply because the glass objects are indeed small and don't require a lot of display space. One or two china cabinets will do nicely. Large plates, water sets or punch bowls on the other hand do require significant display areas. Residences such as apartments, condos or town homes can easily accommodate smaller glass displays. Another aspect to building an appropriate sized collection involves quantity. There are probably a few thousand variations in carnival glass tumblers. Where does one start collecting? Do you try to collect every pattern or only expensive tumblers, or tumblers made in a certain color? How many people really want to own a few thousand glass tumblers? The focused collection is a more practical alternative.

The focused collection still offers the challenge of trying to assemble all the variations of a particular pattern and/or color, but the collecting effort is a bit easier in terms of size, scope and cash outlay. A well managed collection usually offers greater personal satisfaction. As growing numbers of retirees enter their "golden years", I'm confident most want convenience and pleasure in their glass collecting pursuits. This truthful reality strongly suggests that collections of small carnival rarities will be very popular and very easy to liquidate. Good Hunting!

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL WITH CHUCK

As I was going through some old HOACGA bulletins, I cam across some items that brought back memories. Marge and I enjoyed our auctions and conventions and attended many - some more memorable than others. Once in a while there is the one-of-a-kind auction like the one in Asheville, North Carolina in 1988. The auction was normal, but the difference was the complimentary prime rib dinner the hotel served those of us still around later in the afternoon.

And then there was the Woody Auction in Ohio in mid 1970's. Woody charged a lunch fee (\$5.00 if my memory is correct). When we stopped for lunch, Marge and I sat down at a table and introduced ourselves to the couple across from us. That couple was Harold and Arline Cox. We were collectors from the same city and didn't known each other. That was the start of a lovely friendship for Marge and me.

I also remembered some stupid buying mistakes or learning experiences. Like the time the nice toothpick holder was sold. It was a beauty. It should have been since it was new, but sold as old. And there was this miniature piece that had been altered. I do not know why, but I still have these two pieces.

As a table set collector, I was reminded of some missed opportunities. At the I.C.G.A. convention in 1987, I bought an Amethyst Inverted Strawberry set and promptly returned it because it had more problems than I expected. Afterwards, the owner thanked me because he had paid almost twice what it brought in the auction. Well, it took me seven years to find the pieces I have now. The cost much more and I still had to put up with some damage.

The Brown auction in 1975 had 3 or 4 table sets and about 30 butter dishes, but we ended with only one set and one butter. Why? That is what I asked

myself now 23 years later. I guess I did not do my homework before going to the sale. I still do not have two of the butter dishes sold that day.

There are more, but as I look at it now they all added to the enjoyment of our hobby. It wouldn't have been as much fun if everything fell into our lap without research, effort, wonder, doubt and yes mistakes.

February 15, 1988: A week ago, I drove to the far Southwest of our Metro Indy area to preview an auction. New territory and new auction house. The advertised carnival - some Northwood. Well, no carnival, but there was evidence of an old time collector as there were a half dozen I.C.G.A. Appreciation Awards. All were iridized pieces of glass. The sun was shining and I enjoyed the drive as well as talking to the auction house owner. I heard an interesting tax story. Indiana is cracking down on sales tax collection at auctions.

Today there was an estate auction at our county fairgrounds. There was carnival - all of three pieces, one of which was a flower frog. I stayed long enough to see how the crew ran the sale. 

- * A Hospitality time is provided by the club. This is a time of relaxation and visiting with other members.

It takes the support of all collectors and members to promote the hobby in order that its growth and expansion can continue.

In order to obtain our objective, the members must financially support the organization. The Heart of America Carnival Glass Association receives its financial support through the Annual Membership dues and the sale of the following.
