

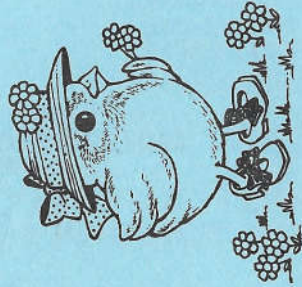

This friendly couple from Yukon, Oklahoma, are two of the nicest people that you will ever meet. They are knowledgeable and enthusiastic about our hobby... and have always been ready and willing to help us at HOACGA whenever they are asked. We are confident that you will enjoy their Carnival Glass story:

"Carnivalitis" is not only a highly addictive disease, it is also a very sneaky disease. Some 13 or 14 years ago, we purchased our first piece of carnival to have something bright and pretty to sit on the fireplace mantel. Over the next couple of years, a few more pieces managed to sneak into the house. From a dealer at our local flea market we got a copy of a HOACGA bulletin and discovered that there were clubs for people addicted to "Carnivalitis".

Our first convention was Air Capitol at Wichita, Kansas. Talk about kids in a candy shop! The doors to the rooms were open, people were wandering in and out and there was carnival glass everywhere, even on the beds. We were so bedazzled by seeing all that glass in one place that we had no idea what to do at the auction. However, the nice auctioneer assured us that he would tell us when we bid too much so we figured everything would be okay. That was lesson number 1 - never believe an auctioneer. Just kidding, actually auctioneers are pretty nice guys.

Lesson number 2 was that not all carnival glass is created equal. After lots of reading, talking to other collectors and just seeing more of the glass at auctions and conventions, we became more aware of the differences. The iridescence and quality of mold work on 2 pieces of the same pattern, shape and color can make them look as different as night and day.

Lesson number 3 was that you can't collect it all. We tried - the more we saw and the more we bought, the more we wanted. It really is addictive. As our education progressed, we tried to convince ourselves that more is not always better. We began to be a little more selective in our purchases. Of course, we still "go ape" over a particular piece from time to time.

Our favorite probably would be Millersburg, partly for sentimental reasons (Dick's family has lived in the Millersburg area since 1735) and partly because of the sheer beauty of Millersburg glass. We also like plates of any size. At this stage in our collecting, we are not concentrating on any particular thing. If it's a good piece and we like it (and can afford it) it finds a new home in Oklahoma.

We retired in 1994 (Dick from the Engineering Department of St. Anthony Hospital and Jennie from the Law Department of Oklahoma Gas and Electric Company in Oklahoma City). Needless to say, a large part of our time since then has been spent chasing carnival glass from the east coast to the west coast. It's a good way to really see this beautiful country of ours - why else would we be in Hanford, CA or Buffalo, MO, or Batavia, NY?

Carnival glass collecting is a very enjoyable hobby in so many ways but the best part is the people you meet. We have formed so many friendships with people all over the country. The glass may be sold someday but the friendships and the memories will always be there and when you have friends, you are truly blessed.

ONE FLOWER BOWL -
TWO DIFFERENT TREATMENTS

Ed Kramer has one of these European bowls with a glass "frog" for a lid. We have one in our collection... but our has a brass webbed type top made to hold flowers.

Our bowl was purchased in a small antique shop in Wamego, Kansas, while Ed obtained his at a large carnival glass auction in 1997. Both of our bowls have a deep rich marigold color with beautiful iridescence.

These unique pieces have been called by different names. Bill Edwards calls it a "Flower Block" and says that the pattern is a "spin off" of Curve Star... or a Curved Star variant. Frankia Brannan, writing in Marion Hartung's book 9, page 88, says that "It is quite possible that this variant pattern was designed especially for this unusual flower holder."



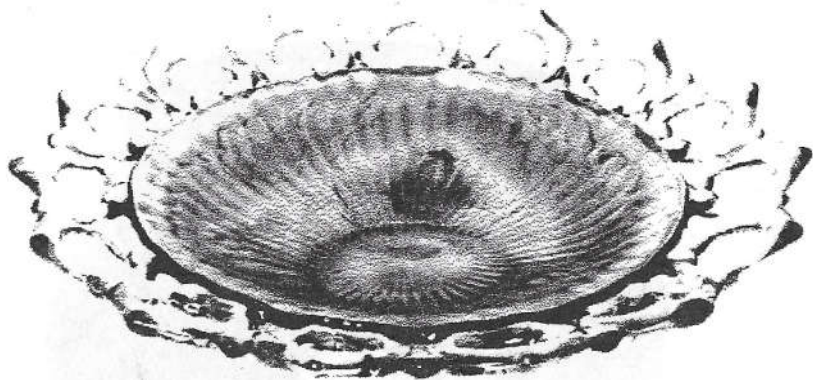
The regular Curved Star pattern is pictured on a rose bowl in the HOACGA Notebook section of Rosebowl... picture #14. Some call this pattern Cathedral.

The Flower Block has also been referred to as a Victorian Flower Block. It was apparently designed and produced by Sweden's Eda Works. The bowl stands 4½" high without the glass frog... and is approximately 6½" across at the widest point. The opening at the top measures 4". The collar base is 3½" in diameter. Some of these bowls have been found with a small brass stand as shown in Mr. Edward's Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass.

This Swedish Flower Block, although relatively inexpensive at the present time, is not often seen. One of them with either a glass or a brass lid would be a nice addition to any collection of carnival glass.

WILD ROSE WHIMSEY PLATE BY NORTHWOOD

I became infatuated with this pattern when Carol and I purchased the above pictured whimsy plate at the 1996 Pacific Northwest Convention Auction in Eugene, Oregon. Over the years, we have accumulated five pieces of this pattern including (1) nut bowl in a fiery amethyst; (1) nut bowl in a rich purple; (1) nut bowl in marigold; (1) rose bowl in green; and lastly, the above picture whimsy plate. Not until recently have we had an opportunity to put all five pieces together for a true comparison study. The results were quite surprising. The three nut bowls have (26) alternating smooth and stippled rays in the interior. The two green pieces have (51) smooth rays in the interior. The nut bowls have the iridescent treatment on both exterior and interior surfaces while the green pieces are iridized on the smooth rays only. The "flames" on the nut bowls have a rich satiny iridescence versus a more lack-luster treatment on the green pieces. The nut bowls (3) knurled feet have a smooth flowing confluence into a round 2½" collar, and the feet have about 3½" separation, while the green pieces have the knurled feet that seem to have been "snipped" off on the interior and merge bluntly into a 1½" "Marie" type collar and these feet have an approximate 4" separation. The shell-like motif on the nut bowls had (10) separate folds while the green pieces shell motif has (12).

According to Carl Burns in his research on Northwood, these pieces are known in marigold, amethyst, green, cobalt blue, and ice blue and in his book, picture a green bowl with a plain, unpatterned interior. He also lists this bowl as being available in a collar based shape. The example shown in HOACGA's Carnival Glass Patterns is also a green unpatterned example in a rose bowl shape. They also list one known example in celeste blue with an attribution suspected to be Dugan.

Conclusions: I suspect that there were at least two different molds used for this pattern, and perhaps Dugan might also have manufactured these pieces using the Northwood mark. All of our examples have the encircled and underlined "N". The appearance of the "Marie" on the green examples is definite evidence of a different procedure used in their manufacture. In my personal observations, I have never seen a green example with the alternating stippled and smooth rays, nor have I seen a green example with iridization applied to the exterior surface. The above pictured whimsy plate would surely have to be considered very rare and I have never seen another example, but who knows, there certainly may be more examples out there.

STIPPLED RAYS BREAKFAST SET

We have collectors and authors split on this pattern with some favoring Fenton, and others calling it Imperial.

This pattern is shown in 4 shapes. The creamer stands 4" tall, and has 30 alternating smooth & stippled panels. The sugar stands 3 3/4" tall, and 3 3/8" across rim to rim. It has 36 alternating smooth and stippled panels. The flared sugar has an open round flare that is 4 1/8" across rim to rim. The whimsy sugar has both handles pulled up, and the opposite sides pulled out. It measures 5 1/4" rim to rim at the widest point, and 3" at the handles.

Marigold & blue are the colors found most often. Other colors in this pattern are teal green, smoke, vaseline, green, amber, & red.

All sets I have seen consisted of just the creamer & sugar. If anyone has found sets of more than 2 pieces, or has this pattern in other colors, please let me know. The flared sugar, and the whimsy sugar are found occasionally as a single piece. Creamers seem to be difficult to find when trying to complete these sets.

ROSE GARDEN

This is a picture of the extremely rare Rose Garden rose bowl on a stem or brass footed holder.

The bottom holder is bolted right through the glass bottom. Definitely original. Dimensions of bowl are 3½" high, 4" base, 6½" open on top.

Brass base is 5" across the four feet. Height of base is 2½".

I believe this is a whimsey!

The Rose Garden pattern is a product of Brockwitz of Germany.

END OF THE QUIET PERIOD?

A commentary on Carnival Price Trends

I would have written this commentary 1 year ago, but didn't possess the correct vision or understand the Internet's marketing power adequately so as to make a personal belief known to others, at least in writing.

Information technology, like it or not is changing the way we do business and it certainly impacts each of us, hopefully for the better. Credit cards are now used to buy fast food and groceries, Social Security payments are deposited directly into bank accounts and federal income taxes can be filed electronically. And yes, you can send an "e-mail" (electronic mail) bid to the carnival glass auctioneers. No more postage stamps or reliance on the U.S. Mail. Using the Internet, prospective carnival buyers are afforded the opportunity to view enlarged color photos of glass. Collectors participating during an "ongoing" glass auction, might even contemplate a bid for hours or even days as in the case of carnival auctions sponsored by the WWW.CGA Carnival Club. The good news is that the Internet has opened the door enabling more people to enjoy the hobby. The Internet allows people who cannot travel because of health, travel expense or distance to be ACTIVE participants in carnival collecting and in group discussions. Because of the internet, I predict a dramatic increase in the number of collectors and an upswing in glass prices. The equation of "Supply and Demand" as it applies to carnival collecting is changing.

Auction results from the Tampa Bay Carnival Club, the Burns auction in Cleveland, Ohio and the Southern California/San Diego convention all reflect robust, upward price trends. In recent years, glass prices have held steady, but there has not been a major upward price movement. The Internet, in my opinion will improve Carnival Glass values. Now, if I can just persuade the auctioneers to accept credit cards when I make those infrequent, impulsive buying decisions. When I buy a \$12.00 pizza, sometimes I use a credit card. Why not allow credit cards in making glass purchases?

The auction reports, as I interpret them, indicate this will be a good year for carnival glass. I suggest collectors look to the future and not the past when making those important, critical buying decisions. The "buying signal" is becoming stronger. Good Hunting.

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL WITH CHUCK

February 27-28, 1998: Burns Auction Service sold the Markley collection at Springfield, Ohio. Will wonders never cease - Tom had this brochure in our hands weeks, yes weeks, before the auction. It would have been a shame to have an auction of this calibre without plenty of advance notice. Ask Mildred what she threatened to do to him if he didn't get the brochure out early. Mildred had the glass clean, and the TLC showed, which I am sure helped the results. The Markleys had collected this glass over many years and always bought what they like with an eye to future value - and it paid off.

The Millersburg Pipe Humidor was supposed to be the star of the auction and at \$12,000, it lived up to its billing. There were many pieces that sold for record or near record prices to the surprise of a few people. The amethyst Millersburg Dolphins compote with Rosalind interior was a beauty and brought \$3,750. The blue Millersburg Deep Grape round flared stemmed compote (one of maybe two known) sold for \$7,500.

The room was quiet as the marigold 9½" Persian Medallion plate reached \$3,250 and again as the 9" marigold Captive Rose plate sold for \$1,300. The rare blue Imperial Flute toothpick holder sold for \$900 and the vaseline one at \$625. Overall, the tumblers sold well, with the green Morning Glory one at \$900, blue Peach at \$330 and the purple Imperial Fashion at \$800 as the better examples.

Mildred was proud of her Good Luck pieces. She sold about a dozen with the aqua opal ruffled bowl going for \$6,250, the dark ice blue ruffled bowl at \$4,300, and the ruffled ice green one at \$4,500. Prices were good on most of the mid-range pieces, but the peach opal items had to be a disappointment.

In my opinion, "one owner" sales are a pleasure to attend, and this one certainly filled the bill. It was a real fast paced auction and well conducted by Tom and his staff. I talked to Mildred after the sale and she was full of praise for Tom and the auction team and real happy with the results.

March 4-7, 1998: San Diego-Southern California Convention. Again the two clubs co-sponsored a super convention at Ontario, California. It takes a lot of effort to plan and the carry it all through to the end. These two groups did it very well. Many people worked behind the scene, but the most visible person throughout the convention was the bundle of energy Shirley Patterson who was the hostess in the hospitality room. A big job and a lot of effort and she ran a good show.

The convention had four major presentations of our glass and a good Seeck auction. They kept us busy. I was able to present one of the seminars only because of the support I had. Without Don and Lynda Grizzle picking up and transporting my glass to Ontario and Dean & Diane Fry furnishing the risers, covers and lights, I wouldn't have been able to have done it. They made my part easy and enjoyable.

Jim Seeck had a good mid-range type of auction that seemed to exceed expectations. In my opinion, it was a good sale and everyone should have been happy. Like most convention auctions, there were some good buys as evidenced by the cheer from a lady when she bought the green Acorn Burrs table set for \$550 (minus the sugar bowl base). When Jim sold item number 10, an amethyst Seacoast pin tray, for \$1,800 I knew it would be a bad day for my checkbook if I got anything.

The Ontario Hilton was a nice location, there was a lot of glass in the rooms, a good auction, two very good clubs as sponsors and a wide variety of programs. This was one of those "don't miss" conventions.

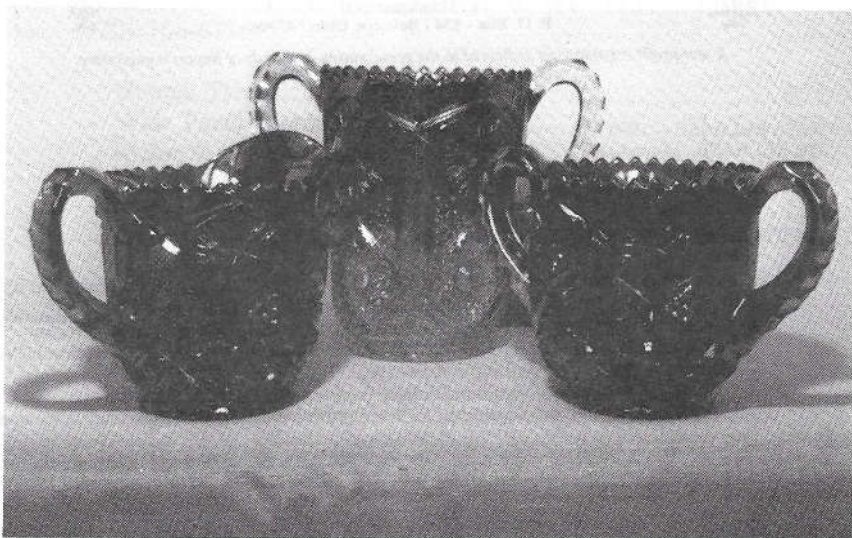

IMPERIAL'S STAR & FILE

Here is an Imperial pattern that has always been one of our favorites. Perhaps because it is so easily recognized. We show here the creamer and open sugar, sometimes referred to as a breakfast set, and a two-handled celery vase or spooner. There are many shapes available and it must have been turned out in very large numbers, as it is quite obtainable today in certain shapes. But at the same time, we have always wondered why they apparently never made this in a complete table set. Surely, a butter dish would have been a handsome addition to this classic geometric style.

The most often seen color is a rich marigold with an occasional amber rose bowl found now and then. Other colors that have been reported in the rose bowl shape are purple, helios and ice green. Those colors must be very rare indeed, especially the ice green, if there is such a thing as ice green Imperial. One of the shapes that puzzles us is the wine decanter. We have never found one that we consider as old. Are there really old wine decanters and wine glasses? The decanters we have examined have all been marked with the I/G trademark. Another mystery is where are all the wine glasses that went with these decanters? The decanters are very weakly signed and you have to really look close to see the mark.

Other common items seen here in the mid-west are bowls of various sizes and shapes, including the square bowls. The oval two handled relish dish also shows up quite regularly. We have also seen a couple of marigold stemmed compotes.

This compote according to Carl Burns' Imperial Carnival Glass book was also made in clambroth. Carl's book lists some twenty shapes, many listed as scarce to extremely rare. And we certainly agree with that.

This is one of those patterns considered so common by most collectors that there is a real danger in passing up a really rare piece. And yet it is a "near cut" pattern that is easily recognized. Some of Imperials geometric designs can be befuddling. We once encountered a punch bowl top in a shop that took us several days and a 100 mile return trip with an Imperial book and the HOACGA pattern book in our hands, and we were still confused as to what we were looking at. It was a rare Imperial Royalty pattern that on closer examination had a large crack. We thought we knew what it was on the first sighting and didn't inspect it, which is always a mistake. After returning home and realizing it was not what we thought it was, curiosity dictated the return trip. No, we didn't buy it. But the next time we see Royalty, we will recognize it.

If there is an Imperial Star & File rose bowl out there somewhere in ice green glass, we hope our name is on it.

SWEDE TILBERG

Swede Tilberg is a knowledgeable carnival glass collector, a wonderful friend of many of us... and a strong supporter of several of the clubs. We feel certain that you will enjoy his story.

I was born on a farm near Dwight, Ks. on August 3, 1919. Dwight is approximately thirty miles south of Manhattan, Ks. Graduated from Dwight High School in 1937 and Bethany Collage of Lindsborg, Ks. in 1941. In the fall of 1941, I took a coaching and teaching job at Kensington, Ks.

In December, 1941, I received a letter from Uncle Sam saying, "Greetings, we need you". Spent four years in the army mostly in their physical reconditioning program. Upon discharge from the service, I played semi-pro basketball in Kansas City for three years before becoming a sales representative selling yearbooks, diplomas, graduation announcements and cards, etc, to high schools and colleges. I sold these products for forty years.

Early in the 80's, when Vaunda and I started dating (we were married in 1983), we decided we needed to look for a hobby. School principals usually closed their offices 3:00 or 4:00 P.M. and in traveling we needed something to do between those hours and 6:00 P.M. So we started to shop in antique stores and flea markets and became interested in carnival glass.

One day when we were in Kansas City, we stopped in an antique mall at 75th and Wornall and visited with Norma McDonald. She sold us a beautiful Electric Blue stippled ruffled Good Luck bowl for \$240. She told us at the time that since we bought the Good Luck bowl, we were now eligible to join the HOACGA; and that they were having a convention at the Holiday Inn in Mission, Ks. We went and observed all the beautiful glass in the windows, and we were hooked. Our first convention was the following year at the Holiday Inn at the Airport.

Vaunda passed away in March, 1992. Her brother had invited me to visit them in Sun City, Az. So after the 1st of January, I loaded up two boxes of glass that I planned to sell at the Texas Convention on my return

trip and took off. I took the HOACGA roster book and called and visited members on the trip. Met Anna Glasgow of Williamsburg, New Mexico and her niece Donna Saunders of Tucson, Phillip Hassenius of Phoenix, Cliff and Mary Hoblit of Sun City West and others that I can't recall their names. Also renewed my acquaintance with Lou and Dale Knight of Phoenix. Sold most of the glass but reloaded with new purchases on the trip.

My first stop was the Tauhlie and Roy Chapman home in Springtown, Tx. I had sold them some glass and met Tauhlie at the Air Capitol in the fall of 1991. When visiting with them, they indicated they were interested in selling their collection. We agreed to stay in touch and I would contact them in late February after I returned from the trip.

On the trip, I made some super purchases including a sapphire stippled Grape & Cable plate for \$190, and a white Apple Blossoms plate for \$100 at an antique shop in Hobbs, New Mexico (Sorry Arnold), a green Night Stars bon bon for \$45 in Phoenix, a jockey club bowl in purple, bushel baskets in lime green, teal blue, and aqua opal with a couble bottom and a red Holly hat that I bought at an auction in Sun City, Az.

The red Holly hat I had in my room at the Texas convention for \$450 - it didn't sell so I put it in the midnight auction and it sold for \$650. (Thanks Pat) Upon returning, I called the Chapmans and bought their collection (approximately 200 pieces - great trip).

I belong to: HOACGA, ICGA, Texas, Air Capitol, Lincoln Land, and San Diego County.

Besides my carnival glass hobby, I golf. As I get older, my scores get higher for some reason. (I have had six holes-in-one. Ask Steve how many he has.) I have met many good people and developed many friends in the carnival glass world. To my friends: "Good Hunting and Good Luck".

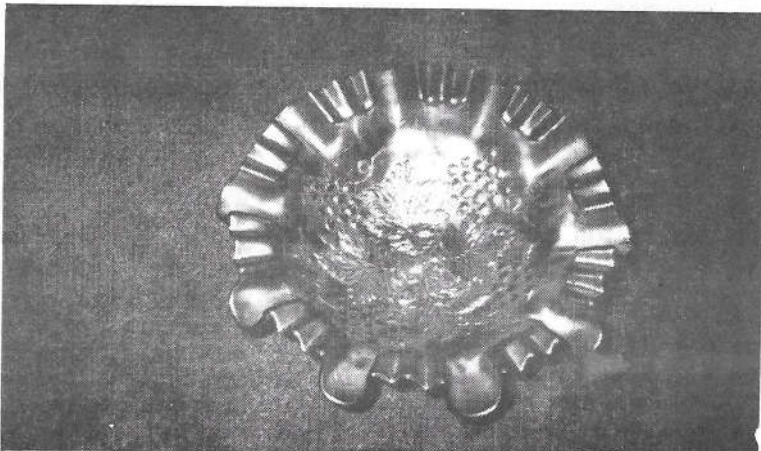
CORRESPONDENCE
