



IMPERIAL'S THREE IN ONE PATTERN #1

This unappreciated bowl sat in a local antique mall several months before we finally, but reluctantly, decided to give it a better home. The truth is we couldn't find any rare, one of a kind, only a few known, or any other exotic examples of carnival glass that day. Are we sorry? Not at all.

Something that has always mystified us is why people who sell old glass apparently feel that washing it is somehow detrimental. This bowl was long overdue for a good cleaning. The result was that underneath many years of neglect was a beautiful example of Imperial's sparkling smoke glass.

The iridescence is as good as it gets and was applied to both the inner and outer surfaces. This is the larger sized bowl, 7" to 9" depending on where it is measured, and is pulled out to six ruffles. The marie is almost 4" across and has a 30 point intaglio star. Made with a three part mould, this was Imperial's mould No. 1.

Large and small bowls are found in marigold, clambroth, helios, smoke and an occasional purple; ruffled as well as ice-cream shaped. The colors are listed in the

order of the relative scarcity. This pattern is also found in a small seven inch marigold plate. One sold recently in a Tom Burns auction in Springfield, Ohio for only \$35. Also known in a rare but again, apparently unappreciated, marigold rosebowl made from an 8" bowl. (\$75 to \$200 price range??)


Rosebowls made in purple and smoke remain a real possibility. Only in the last couple of years rosebowls like Imperial's Diamond Ring have begun to surface in colors other than marigold. Several years ago we found a nice pastel marigold in Oklahoma that we sold at a HOACGA convention. And know that two Diamond Ring rosebowls in smoke were sold at auctions in the last couple of years, although not listed in the Mordini auction results. We continue to read of recent finds of previously unheard-of carnival glass. So it may be just a matter of time before some collector will discover a beautiful Three in One rose bowl in smoke or an eye-catching purple. But in the meantime, we would be pleased to find a nice marigold example.

TOMAHAWK By Jerry & Carol Curtis



We just recently purchased this little novelty item and feel very fortunate that we were able to get it. It is called "Tomahawk" by most writers and is known in carnival glass in marigold and cobalt blue. This one is in the rare cobalt blue. There is one of those items that you find bits and pieces by various authors, so we will try to put those bits and pieces into perspective for you. First, in Bill Edwards 5th Edition, he attributes this item to the Cambridge Glass Company. In John & Lucile Britt's Educational series number three, the Tomahawk is listed as a Millersburg product. In Bill Edward's 6th edition, he makes reference to the close working relationship between the Millersburg and Cambridge Glass Companies, indicating that Millersburg may have done the actual iridizing of some of the Cambridge glass. It is interesting to note here that through survey results of the HOACGA membership, five or less of these was found in cobalt blue. Regardless of the manufacturer, this is certainly an extremely rare item and a search of Mordini's price guide bears that out, as only (2) marigold and no blue ones have been reported sold at auction in the past ten years. Perhaps of all the information and illustrations presented on this piece, Marion Hartung in her article found in Book #6 give the most detailed information. The bold relief of an Indian Chief is found on one side of the blade only, accompanied with a "V" shaped beading on the wider portion of the blade, and what appears to be a leaf, berry, and vining design down the upper

half of the handle. The beading and vine design is replicated on the reverse side of the hatchet. The length is 71/4" and the blade is 4 3/8" long by 2" wide. Rose Presznick in her Book #4 adds a little more information. She refers to the piece as "Big Chief Tomahawk" and implies the Indian might possibly have been in honor of Chief Lodi for whom the city of Lodi, Ohio was named. Her illustration was copied from a marigold piece, while Ms. Hartung's pattern was patterned from a blue example. Ms. Presznick stated that she also had a non-iridized blue milk glass one exactly like her sketched example. Both authors felt storeowners gave these items away or they were sold at souvenir stands, possibly even at a World's Fair. A friend of mine, Tony Dellavecchia of Dallas, Texas has several examples of the non-iridized variety, one he described as cobalt blue with a white swirl effect. He has done quite a bit of research on these Tomahawks and provided the following information. The mould originally belonged to the National Glass Conglomerate, (US Glass?), located in Cambridge, Ohio, (perhaps Cambridge Glass?). When John Degenhart began glass production in Cambridge, Ohio in 1947, he obtained the original mould. He produced these Tomahawks from the opening until 1978 in various colors, although none in marigold or cobalt blue and I would suspect mostly in non-iridized glass. He did, however, place his mark, a "D" inside a heart, on the Tomahawks reissued from the original moulds. Occasionally, Degenhart Tomahawks may be found without the "ball" knob opposite the cutting edge. Later production featured "mini-tomahawks". Boyd's Crystal Art Glass, of Cambridge, Ohio, also produced Hatchets and Tomahawks, producing them in almost 300 different colors. Some of these also featured an Indian Head. Perhaps one of the more interesting articles written about these Tomahawks is found in Sherman Hand's book on carnival glass published in 1978. He recalled seeing these Tomahawks, mostly in clear glass, in ten pound wooden buckets of "Christmas hard-candy". He said the storekeeper would open the buckets to sell a penny or nickel's worth at a time, and some lucky kid who happened to be around would be given the Tomahawk. Perhaps that explains why there are so few examples of these found today. They never survived the great Indian Massacre's played out by those youngsters around the turn of the century. I can recall my own experiences of playing "Cowboys and Indians" and our toy guns, much hardier than these glass Tomahawks, didn't survive very many attacks. We found it very interesting that while Hatchets and Tomahawks were advertised in the early Butler Brothers Catalogs, in crystal and ruby-flashed finish, no Tomahawks of this particular pattern were advertised. This leads us to believe that this particular Tomahawk was a special production item for a single company, perhaps as Sherman Hand indicated, a premium item included with a candy company's product. In any case, you are indeed fortunate if you can count one of these rarities in your collection.

WHAT WAS THE ORIGINAL PRICE OF A PIECE OF CARNIVAL GLASS

We carnival glass collectors often hear the phrase "carnival glass was so cheap when it was made that they practically gave it away". Was that really so? I have always questioned this theory, so I decided to do a little research to find the truth. We cannot judge the cost of a piece in 1997 by using 1912 prices... we must compare hourly wages also.

The only major glass company to survive in the business from before the carnival glass era to present time is Fenton Art Glass Company. If we go to a gift shop today, we find the following iridized Fenton pieces and their prices and how much time various workers must work to purchase the pieces.

The following lists the present day individual iridized pieces on the left side "A". Under "B" are their prices. "C" through "G" give the hourly rate of each occupation and the approximate number of hours labor they would have to work to earn money enough to buy each particular piece.

What conclusion can we draw from this? Carnival glass as originally made was inexpensive enough for the average working man or woman to buy, but it required approximately the same number of hours' wages to buy as today's Fenton pieces at the local gift shop. It was never dirt cheap. It was certainly cheaper than art glass of that era... it was sometimes called poor man's art glass... but it was within the budget of the average working man. So our carnival glass was always affordable, but never cheap!

ALBERTA WHITE

Alberta White of Candler, North Carolina, has shared her interesting carnival glass story with us. We think that you will enjoy reading it!

At the age of around six or seven (1942), my aunt that I had lived with off and on showed me six carnival glass tumblers. These tumblers were wrapped in paper and kept in a basket in a building that was used to store feed for the cows and chickens. I was told that the tumblers had belonged to my grandmother and would be mine when I grew up.

Down through the years we would take these six tumblers out from time to time. My aunt always wondered what had happened to the pitcher, but we never found out. I was told that the glass was no longer made and would be valuable some day.

The tumblers became mine when I married in 1954, and soon I found out that they were Acorn Burr by Northwood and were purple in color.

Down through the years I would search for the pitcher and in the process would buy a piece now and then. I later was co-owner of a Real Estate and Construction firm that purchased old homes, and on occasion, I would find a nice piece. Then, one day while listing a home for sale I was told about a lady with carnival glass for sale. Her father, Don Moore in Asheville, North Carolina, had died and she had one half of his collection and her brother the other half. I bought \$500 of carnival glass from her and just selected pieces at random... not even knowing the value and she didn't either. However, among those 15 pieces that I purchased was a green Millersburg Peacock at the Fountain ice cream shaped bowl. Need I say more? I have wondered if this Don Moore could be the same one that I see mentioned in so many carnival books. Could someone let me know?

This past year I learned of HOACGA and joined. A few months later I purchased an Acorn Burr pitcher from Richard Cinclair. What a thrill when it arrived; the tears flowed. I am now 63 years old.

WESTERN THISTLE WATER SET

This water set made by Riihimaki of Finland is extremely rare and seldom seen. You will not find it pictured among the 120 other water sets in the HOACGA Pattern Notebook... nor, is the pattern found in any of Marion Hartung's ten books on carnival glass. The tumblers, but not the pitcher, are discussed on page 174 of HOACGA's Educational Series Book II, published in 1992.

The Western Thistle is a very pretty, deep intaglio pattern with rows of diamonds below a band of thistle flowers and leaves. It is easy to distinguish this pattern from Wide Panel Thistle, also made in Finland, or the Inverted Thistle produced by Cambridge.

In the last three years only one Western Thistle pitcher and four tumblers have been sold at auction. All of these pieces were blue in color. When the pitcher was offered at the Air Capital Convention Auction in October of 1996, the sale bill indicated that it was one of three known at that time.

The Western Thistle pattern was first reported in the United States back in 1977 when Charles Adams of California found six marigold tumblers and sold them to six prominent tumbler collectors. These collectors decided to call the pattern Western Thistle.

Whimsey vases made from marigold tumblers have been seen, and one sold at auction in September of 1995 for \$265.

No where in our carnival literature is there any mention of a marigold Western Thistle pitcher. With marigold tumblers in existence, a pitcher of this color could be out there waiting to be discovered by some very fortunate collector. Perhaps, some time, some place you will be the one to find it.

WESTMORELAND'S CHECKERBOARD WATER SET

We wanted to do an article on this fabulous water set while it is still in our possession, for it will soon be going on the auction block. It is an amethyst Checkerboard water set attributed to the Westmoreland Glass Company. In researching this pattern, we found it was first offered in crystal and gold inlay in the Butler Brother's catalog in February 1911. It was called "Gold Ribbon", probably due to the gold inlay within the lattice work and burnished gold edging. Strangely, we found this was the only issue in which the tumblers were offered. Subsequent offerings in 1912 through 1924 offered an assortment of shapes (in crystal only), and this pattern was then called "Brilliant Beauty". None of these advertisements offered tumblers, nor was the gold inlay still available. Bill Edwards stated in his latest edition that there were only 3 amethyst pitchers known at that printing, so this would be the fourth. He further lists the tumblers as rare also, although they are much more plentiful than the pitchers. None of the Butler Brothers offerings indicated these water sets or breakfast sets were available in iridescent ware. One other strange footnote regarding this pattern, there are only two or three marigold tumblers known in the Checkerboard pattern and "zero" marigold pitchers that have been reported to date.

We would have to consider this a very rare water set, made even more so with a full complement of 6 tumblers. Some lucky individual out there is destined to discover the first pitcher in marigold! That would have to be considered an extremely rare find. Happy Hunting!

ON THE AUCTION TRAIL WITH CHUCK

March 27-28, 1998: Burns Auction at Hudson, Ohio. A snappy, well-conducted sale — so fast that we had time to take in much of the Bluegrass Festival going on at the same Holiday Inn if we so desired.

There was a wide variety of glass with a bit more damage than I like to see. Prices were average to good in my opinion. Generally, the prices reflected the quality of the glass, but as usual, there were some bargains. Some price examples were the smoke 8" Heavy Grape plate (\$350), amethyst Millersburg Holly Sprig compote with tight crimped edge (\$1,300), amethyst Heavy Iris tankard pitcher (\$2,600), marigold 8" European Rose Garden vase (\$900), purple Shell and Sand 9½" plate (\$800), emerald green 9" Three Fruits plate with plain back (\$975), powder blue opal ruffled Peacocks bowl (\$9,000), and purple 6" Four Flowers plate at \$375.

April 18, 1998: J/J Auction and Appraisal Service had a combined Custard and Carnival glass auction at Columbus, Ohio. The "J" that I recognized was Joe Johannets from New York State. The sale was well advertised and drew a good crowd. I talked to a couple from central Missouri that saw the ad and came for the custard and left with a nice sized box of it.

Just when I finally got used to the filler words "up and going now", a new to me auction team comes along and the cry was "here we go again" or "Let's go again". The sale was well conducted by Randy Clark — an Ohio auctioneer I was told. The sale was a bit long — I left after six hours and there was at least an hour and a half to go yet. The coffee and sandwiches were a welcome relief.

The glass covered a wide range with no extreme high end pieces. Worth mention were the 9" amethyst Dragon and Strawberry IC shaped bowl (\$2,600), the nice purple Town Pump (\$1,000), and the unusual horehound Grape & Cable cracker jar at \$475. There was considerable damage in the glass, which somewhat affected the continuity of the sale. The auction team did make every effort to inform the buyers. The surprise to me was the good prices paid on the lower end pieces — damaged or not. If there was an area where the advertising paid off, this was it.

April 22-24, 1998: HOACGA Convention, Kansas City, Missouri. This convention has a reputation as a first class event and this year's once in a blue moon auction made for a real carnival glass extravaganza. What an auction! An abundance of rare pieces with color and iridescence to match — unbelievable. Over the years, I had seen Joyce and Bobby Seale purchase many super examples of carnival glass, but until I saw it all spread out before my eyes, I didn't realize just how extensive a collection they had acquired.

I came to look and dream and from the size of the crowd, I wasn't alone. It took Jim Seeck just over six hours to pull mega bucks from our pockets. Yes, there was a constant stream of record or near record prices, but every once in a while someone grabbed a bargain.

There were many attending this convention for the first time and from comments I heard, they were impressed with the program highlighted by this auction. Don't despair, there is another super-super auction scheduled for next year at this same time and location. Make your plans now, you have another chance. HOACGA will try it's best to live up to the standard this one set!

1998 CONVENTION HIGHLIGHTS

HOACGA's 25th Anniversary was celebrated the week of April 20th at the Embassy Suites near KCI airport. THIS WAS A SIGNIFICANT EVEN IN CARNIVAL GLASS. I might mention a videotape was made and will be available later.

Thursday at noon, the Britt award luncheon was attended by 160 people. The award this year honors Bob & Imogene Grissom and is also in memory of Bob's first wife Rosa Grissom. Lucile Britt presented the award, a beautiful hand painted and inscribed Fenton cranberry vase. 
