Not many pieces of Carnival Glass were made in Vaseline and even fewer were made in Vaseline Opalescent. It is a beautiful piece of Carnival Glass. It has a very nice pastel iridescence and the opalescence is very good. I believe any member will be glad to have one or more of this souvenir. Only 225 pieces were made.

The Room Display award, the "Hobnail" spittoon, and the Banquet Table Favor, "Orange Tree" Wine were both made in the same color.

EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS: If you do not attend the carnival glass conventions you are not taking advantage of the very informative programs that are presented. Again this year the programs were outstanding.

Steve and Glen Thistlewood presented a program "Stars In Your Eyes". They reviewed many patterns, U.S. and Non U.S., that contain a star in some part of their pattern. She displayed and talked about what she considered to be the top 10 Carnival Glass tumblers. Floyd displayed three "Peoples" vases, two were his and one was from the collection of Stacy Wills. He reviewed the history of each of the known vases. When you have three "Peoples" vases and the top ten Carnival Glass tumblers all displayed at the same place, it is something that you will probably only have an opportunity to see once in your collecting lifetime. Floyd and Cecil, we appreciate your sharing some of your glass with us.

After the Banquet Tom Burns, and the Billy Richards did the Whimsey auction. Thanks for your help. Frank Fenton sent a Whimsey made from the Red "Holly" plate that was made in honor of his 85th birthday. It was a PCE bowl with excellent iridescence, it sold for \$750.00, thanks Frank. Glen Thistlewood donated two of her drawings, one of the "Good Luck" and the other of the Northwood "Peacock", thank you Glen. The other Whimseys were from the Vaseline Opal Hatpin Holder and the Blue Pansy Plates, which were painted.

"JOHN & LUCILE BRITT AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN CARNIVAL GLASS". This award is given each year not only to honor the Britts, but, to recognize a collector(s) who has demonstrated their dedication and service to Carnival Glass. The bidding started off rather slow and the Auctioneers seem to labor all day to get that final bid on each piece. The auction continued for about 6 hours, Tom and the two Bills knew that they had done a days work when the auction was over. We want to thank Mr & Mrs Danny McFall for bringing your glass to HOACGA for auctioning.

ANNUAL MEETING – It is required that an Annual meeting be held at 2:00 P.M. on the fourth Friday of the month of April. At this time new officers are elected. Officers elected this year were Bob Grissom re-elected as President, and Ann McMorris was reelected as the club Secretary.

Gary Tapper, Minnesota, purchased his tumbler from a person in California. It has a slight lavender tint. It is perfect, except it has a ground base.


Paul & Dorthy Epple, Indiana, purchased their tumbler at a local auction several years ago. It has some damage on the base.

Split Diamond

We believe this to be an English pattern made by Teams Glass Works of George Davidson of Gateshead, England. We hesitate to call this a table set but it does come closer to being a table set than anything else. The petite creamer, three and one half inches tall, seems to be fairly common. But other pieces are a little more challenging to find. The butter dish is pictured here with what we consider a covered sugar. The butter dish looks small in the picture because it is set back, but it measures six and one half inches in diameter. Some authors state that this set comes with an open sugar. Then again this piece may really be a "mustard or jam jar" and not a sugar at all. The lid has an opening for spoons handle.

We have made use of a Split Diamond sugar bottom with a "Block Diamond" top for many years on our table. We bought it that way and we suspect now that Davidson's company presumably made both patterns, so they might have been brought over from England in that mix. It did take us

a few years to realize that we were using a blend of two patterns. Possibly the extreme difficulty of picking up the lids on the Split Diamond sugar and butter dish because of the slick finials, many pieces may have been dropped and destroyed over the years. And that is



likely the reason for their apparent scarcity today. The two sugars pictured together show the difference between the Split Diamond and the Diamond Block in the finial shapes.

The only other shape we have found over the years in Split Diamond is a deep sauce with a five-inch diameter. And we do remember seeing a little larger sauce many years ago. All the pieces we own have a sturdy quality and nice iridescence. The pattern is a bold geometric found in a rich marigold.

There doesn't seem to be any mention of the Davidson glass works in recently published books other than the 1981 "Carnival Glass" book by Angela Hallam who stated then that George Davidson began making glass in 1867 and the company is still making glass. Although we are not sure today under what name the company operates.

Split Diamond is the only pattern we have in our computer inventory as being made by Davidson, although Hobstar and Cut Triangles, another English pattern rose bowl we have has some similarities to the Split Diamond pattern. Another interesting tidbit is in the Angela Hallam book, she reports that a retired Davidson glassmaker can recall turning out Summer Day vases. The Summer Day vase is married today to the Stork in the Rushes Punch bowl and that has always been controversial.

Membership Dues

The cost of the monthly bulletin is exceeding the \$25.00 annual membership dues by about \$5.00 per member. For many it is the only Carnival Glass news they receive for months at a time. Therefore, we do not believe these were the options that should be pursued. We regret having to make this increase but we feel that it is something that is necessary to maintain the information source that we all want.

We know this is not the type of information that members want to receive. It is only through viable Carnival Glass organizations that we will be able to maintain and promote this hobby that we all enjoy and have considerable investments in.

Pond Lily

Much like other Fenton patterns such as Two Flowers and Water Lily, the Pond Lily design utilizes both scale filler and a Lotus-like flower, quite similar to the one seen on Dragon & Lotus pieces. The only shape seen is this collar-base bon-bon. Colors are marigold, blue, green, and an occasional white and amethyst.....A nice red example would be a pleasant surprise.




A good example of any color should not force you to "buy beyond your budget"! However, you could add another pattern to your collection.

Prayer Rug

There are so few of these beautiful custard base glass bon-bons, having collar-base and marigold iridescent overlay, that newer collectors perhaps have not seen one! We wonder whether only a "turn" was produced by Fenton?

They are scarcely found - again in custard - with silver paint covering the edge design and the fringed "rug" which extends toward center from the four corner of this simple, but interesting pattern.




In all honesty, they do not bring "big bucks", for the simple reason that the iridized examples seldom have much overlay. "Perhaps" one or two appear at auctions each year.....One of those "rare: so whats?"

Czechoslovakian Vases

The publication of a new book by Glen and Stephen Thistlewood, entitled "A Century of Carnival Glass", has provided significant new information on a variety of topics, including new information on foreignmade carnival glass. We are particularly impressed by the beauty of vases produced by the Josef Inwald company in Czechoslovakia.





Both of the vases

shown in the picture above were produced by Inwald and are 8 inches tall. The vase on the left is the Diamond Cut intaglio pattern and the vase on the right is the Princeton pattern (named by John Britt). The Thistlewoods point out in their book that advertisements from 1930 and 1928, call these patterns Edward and Coronet, respectively. A similar Diamond Cut pattern was also made in Australia, but apparently not in the vase shape.

The vases shown here have marigold iridescence, but are quite different in appearance. The Diamond Cut vase has a golden hue that the Thistlewoods call peacock marigold, and it shimmers with turquoise and pink highlights. It resembles pastel marigold produced by U.S. carnival glass companies, but its tones are brighter. The Princeton vase has a rich pumpkin marigold iridescence. Both vases have ground bases, and radium-like finishes. The Diamond Cut vase can also be found in a 12 inch size and 10 inch Princeton vases are known. A beautiful picture of a 12 inch Diamond Cut vase can be found on page 86 of the Thistlewood book. The 12 inch Diamond Cut vase has three diamonds in the vertical pattern compared to two in the 8 inch version.

Both patterns seem to be quite scarce and only one Diamond Cut vase (12 inch) has sold at auction prior to this year. We obtained both of our vases at Reichel Auctions; Princeton in 1999 and Diamond Cut in March, 2001. We feel fortunate to have found examples of these beautiful vases at reasonable prices.

Wisteria Vase

I thought you might be interested in what the late "John Britt" wrote about our vase in the December, 1992 HOACGA Bulletin.

"This beautiful Northwood Wisteria vase is 10 1/4 inches in height. It measures 5 inches across the top and 4 1/2 inches in diameter at the base. The color is green with outstanding blue and purple iridescence on both the interior and exterior. There is a blank space on the vase where the handle was to have been applied. In other words the vase was made from the water pitcher mold with the handle never applied."

We don't believe we have enough adjectives in our vocabulary to describe this beautiful piece of carnival glass, but we will start out by saying that it is very unusual. The main reason for it being so unusual is because the color is green. Wisteria pieces have never turned up before in any color other than the pastel colors of white, ice blue, and ice green. We have owned the

wisteria tumblers in all three pastel colors and the tankard in white and have also seen a few of the pitchers in ice blue, but to see a piece of the wisteria pattern in green is almost unbelievable. It is also very unusual to see a vase in any pattern that was made from the water pitcher mold.

Secondly, the piece is extremely rare. Certainly it is one of the rarest pieces known in Carnival Glass. It is quite likely a one of a kind piece. Only time will tell if another vase like this exists. No other Wisteria vases have ever been reported in any color. We might mention that we have seen a blue paneled dandelion vase that was made in this same manner. We have also seen one in the floral and grape pattern. These are also very rare. The featured green wisteria vase is also very beautiful. All who have ever seen this piece report it to be of super color and iridescence. We also must mention its desirability. We are sure that every carnival glass collector around would like to own and enjoy this lovely piece. Carl Burns has some very interesting theories in his Northwood Carnival book about the origin of this vase.

Editor: Mr. Plotts told me they had purchased the vase at an auction he and his wife had attended. They were aware of the rarity of the piece and the beauty was outstanding. He had to pay a high price for it as there was also another carnival glass collector at the auction that also wanted it. I have seen the vase and it is truly one of the most beautiful pieces in carnival glass.



Annual Treasurer's Report

During the fiscal year which ended on February 28, 2001, the club's expenses went up and its income went down. This situation resulted in our cash assets dropping during the year from \$38,483 to \$21,858.

Some of this year's expenditures which had not been incurred during the previous year included \$2,980 for full color newsletter inserts, \$2,185 for an updated membership roster for all members, \$1,049 for legal fees and \$160 for a fax machine.

Income went down when membership renewals were off, when our sales to members fell and when we no longer were receiving restitution payments from our former Treasurer.

At the present time income from membership dues does not cover the costs of our monthly newsletter. These costs are expected to go even higher with the next postal increase. To cover the costs of the newsletters your Board of Directors voted to increase HOACGA's annual dues.

Exhibits follow to provide you with details of both expenditures and income. If you have questions relating to these finances, I will attempt to answer them for you.



Nippon Bowl

Since you did the Research Project on Nippon bowls, I decided to send you a picture of the Nippon Aqua Opal pie crust edged bowl that I bought 30 years ago. Jim Wroda of J&J Auctions has informed me that a second bowl was found a year or so ago. I purchased my bowl in a small rural town in Northeastern Kentucky. Maysville. My wife and I lived in Maysville for several years. We were just starting to collect carnival when we were living in Maysville. After living several



Cincinnati as I had changed jobs. Upon a return trip to Maysville I went to visit one of the local antique dealers. She said "I know what you're looking for. I have one piece of carnival, an Ice Blue Nippon bowl and it's up on the third floor. I had an Ice Blue Nippon bowl but thought I would take a look at the one that she had for sale. After climbing the steps up to the third floor I could tell from a distance that the bowl was opalescent. You could imagine how I felt when I lifted the bowl and discovered it was an Agua Opal Nippon bowl. I clutched the bowl to my chest as I carried it down the three flights of stairs. I asked her how much she would take for the bowl and she said that she would let me have it for \$75. She wrapped the bowl and I left the store with a big smile on my face. Bob Grissom saw the bowl when he was visiting Dayton some years back. When HOACGA had the large aqua opal display at one of the conventions several years ago he asked if I would send the bowl so it could be displayed. After a discussion with my wife we decided not to send the bowl as we were afraid it might get broken. As you can see from the picture the bowl is beautiful. The opal goes all the way to the base. I understand that the second bowl only has the opal on the very edge. I did take the bowl to one of the conventions and had Tom Burns and Tom Mordini look at it. You could imagine what they said. So that's the story behind the agua Nippon bowl. The other piece of rare agua opal that I have is a grape and cable stippled bon-bon that I bought about twenty years ago. But that's another story.

Some people may say \$75, that is a steal. But they don't remember that 30 years ago \$75 was like paying a couple of thousand for a piece. I was just out of graduate school and bought a house. Seventy-five dollars was a big part of our budget. We used to save for several months to buy a piece of carnival.

First of all, let me say how much I enjoy your articles on researching scarce patterns and shapes in carnival glass . I find them very interesting and informative. In response to your request for patterns to consider in future, I would like to submit the following suggestions for possible inclusion in your survey

possible inclusion in your survey.

I have a beautiful Peach Opalescent carnival glass dish in the Western Daisy pattern. I do not believe there are many pieces around in this pattern and it would be most interesting to find out.

I have been corresponding with a lady in California who also owns a Western Daisy bowl and she and I agree tha thtere is one other one which is picutred in Carl Burns Dugan dna Diamond Carnival Glass book. So that makes three known.

When I purchasd my P.O. Western Daisy dome footed bowl at a Tom Burns auction several years ago, he said he believed there were only 4 or 5 in existence then.

The pattern is on the exterior only, the inside being plain but iridized. It is described in Marion Harting's Book 4 Page 64, and in Carl Burns Dugan Diamond book on page 150, and Carl attributes Dugan as the maker.

David Doty does not show the Western Daisy pattern in his book "A Field Guide to Carnival Glass". Bill Edwards does not picture it in his "Standard Encyclopedia of Carnival Glass" although he lists the pattern in his price guide and attributes it to Westmoreland. Looking back, 5 years of Mordini Auction results there has not been a Western Daisy bowl sold.

I would also like to find out how many Dugan Nautilus vases are out there. They come in marigold and purple. I have a purple 8 inch vase in my collection. There has been one Nautilus 6 inch purple vase sold in 1999 looking back 5 years in Mordini books.

I believe this too would be an interesting pattern to consider for your survey. Sorry I don't have a picture of my vase for you.

April 7, 2001: I had not been to a Jim Wroda auction in sometime so it was a pleasure to got to Columbus, Ohio, to see the Charles King collection sold. The King collection was assembled in the late 1960s and early 1970s and was just what I expected a collection from that era to be like. In the early days we accepted some damage and collected a variety - and this sale represented that style.

There were some highly desirable pieces offered. The green Town Pump (\$4500) and the purple true square-shaped Farmyard bowl at \$5750 were two seldom sold pieces and the bidding was spirited. There were some pieces with good iridescence and some just a cut below, and the prices reflected the buyers' acceptance of the pieces. Some pieces with minor damage were too heavily discounted in my opinion - an example was the great purple Persian Garden chop plate that had a minor chip on one point. I thought it was cheap at \$1500 as it was really nice. There was big crowd and I thought the prices were a bit above average overall.

A couple of people had asked Jim if they could bid by phone and he was accommodating. He tried it, and a couple of pieces did go to the phone bidders. Will he do it again? I don't know, but this seems to be the way to go.

It was beautiful Spring weather and we knew the Wroda sale would be a class act, so Phil Gilliland and I drove over to see friends and a good sale. We were not disappointed. Jim set the tone with the Danish rolls and coffee Saturday morning. Coffee and ice tea were available all during the sale. When Jim opened the sale he told us there were cans of cold soda in the coolers and at noon there would be make-your-own sandwiches and pizza for us. I thought this was a bit more than we should expect, but that is just Jim Wroda style. It wasn't all "style" as Jim conducted a good, fast and enjoyable auction that must have pleased both the seller and the buyer.


