I'm looking forward to HOACGA!! Seeing and visiting with longtime friends and of course looking forward to the auction.

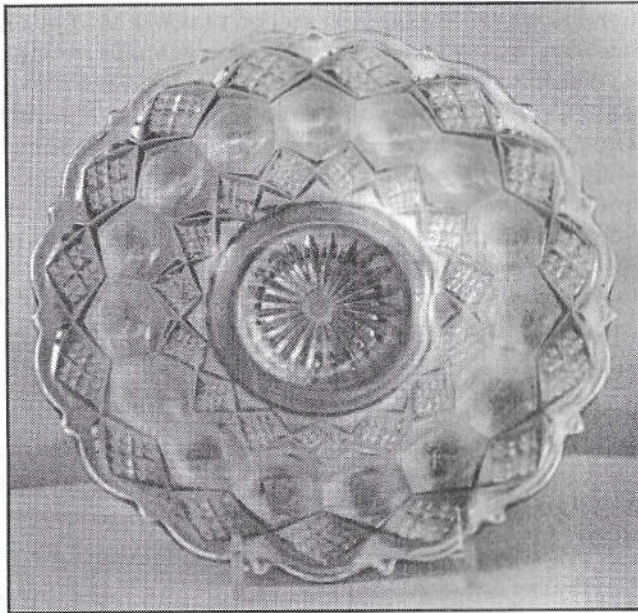

This aqua opal bowl was featured on the cover of the 1st John & Lucile Britt auction and on the cover of the early HOACGA pattern notebooks. M,B,IB, Horehound, White, Aqua Opalescent Poinsettia & Lattice bowls, IB,G,M,P,W,AO Poppy Pickle Dishes, Aqua, Aqua Opalescent stippled Grape & Cable bon bons, Lime Green Opalescent N Bushel Basket along with 12 others, Aqua N Peacocks bowl, Green Peacock at the Fountain Water Pitcher and one tumbler, Dandelion mug and Singing birds mug collection including IB & AO plus other great items. The Three-In-One Plate

This pattern had the unique distinction of being pattern number "one" in Imperial Glass Company's inventory of moulds. And was produced in a variety of shapes by Imperial in non-iridized glass but limited to only a few carnival glass shapes. Usually found in small bowls, small plates a rose bowl and a toothpick holder.



This article will only address this 7" plate. This plate has the pattern on the reverse side with a smooth surface on the obverse. So the iridescence has to be such that the back pattern comes through. This plate is listed as being available in marigold and vaseline in some books. Carl Burns in his Imperial Carnival Glass Book states; "They are quite rare and have been reported only in marigold." The plate and the rare rose bowl were more than likely made from the same bowl mould. The past auction reports record plates and bowls in marigold and bowls in purple and smoke. Carl's book shows a clambroth bowl that comes closest to the color of our plate.

So the question here is this. What color plate do we have and in what colors are these plates really available? This plate isn't a true marigold as the basic color leans towards a translucent lemon or clambroth. The iridescence has lots of pastel shades from lemon sprinkled with magenta and green. This plate's base color doesn't appear to be vaseline, but it does fluoresce under a black light (ultraviolet). Does this made it vaseline color? And is this what is being sold as vaseline? The fact that it "glows" under a black light only indicates that one of the batch ingredients contained some uranium sand. That does not qualify it as being vaseline color. If it does, we

have a house full of vaseline custard glass as well as other glass colors that "light up" with a black light.

Sorry that this article is not offered with a color picture. It sure makes it difficult to make a point or show colors in black and white. But if anyone does have a vaseline plate that requires you to go into a dark room with a black light to prove it – it's probably marigold.

Pacific Coast Mail Order House

We are all familiar with Grape & Cable pattern. It was used and re-used to such proliferation by both Fenton and Northwood, that probably more shapes are available in that pattern than any other in all of Carnival Glass..... leaving us to assume it was a high seller! However, there are a few choice pieces, whether delineated by color or by shape, which can be "turn-ons" for a collector of the unusual.



Specifically, we are here to discuss this little known and quite rare medium size fruit bowl (having the three scroll feet). The "plunger" mold reads: Compliments of Pacific Coast Mail Order House, Los Angeles, and fits nicely into the smooth interior of the 9¼" x 4" deep bowl. The establishment was situated on South Los Angeles Street in the years 1912.

Those of us who enjoy extensive Advertising and Commemoratives collections, prize this bowl quite highly!... The four known marigold examples were found in Southern California. (Ours came from the Central Valley) while we lived in San Diego. We drove there to pick it up following a phone call in early Oct. 1992. There are two known in cobalt blue, and a green bowl was reported found in Colorado in June of 1995. One of the marigold brought \$3,800 at a auction in 1994.

John Resnik reports in his book on Advertising pieces, that the owner of this company lived in a "downtown boarding house" – in one of the lesser desirable neighborhoods. This was a large importer, but by 1919, it ceased to exist. This rare bowl could have been a beginning effort to establish a thriving business, or it could have been a "last-ditch" attempt to revive a faltering one. In any event, we know that the order to Fenton was a small one (OR, many were disposed of in some way) following the premium presentation.....10/01

MultiFruits & Flowers Punchset

This is a green radium Millersburg set. This particular pattern and shape is known in four colors. Marigold (at least 3 known), amethyst (at least 3 known, iridescence varies from not real bad to Fantastic!), green (1 known, great color, radium) and blue (1 known, great color, radium). There are a few extra cups around but I have not kept track of them.

Notice how the top edge curves in. I prefer to call this a rosebowl shape punchbowl instead of tulip top. When I think of tulips, I generally think of an open flower, not a curved in bud. Jack Wilson, carnival glass Millersburg collector who researched Millersburg, wrote about it and bought a lot before finally selling his collection at auction in 1982, popularized this shape as the tulip top bowl.

Wilson, in his 1982 "Millersburg Research Notes," states that the punch bowls come in two variations, the tulip top being rarest and the flared top being known in amethyst, marigold and green. However, we have never seen nor heard of a blue flared bowl. Also, we have never seen an amethyst or green bowl with the brilliant radium iridescence of the best of the rosebowl shaped ones. Wilson stated then, and repeatedly did so, that there were two green tulip top bowls, I repeatedly challenged him on this as I had only heard of one but he never backed up his claim of two. He also stated that there were two marigold and one amethyst round bowls. At that time we had seen two separate amethyst bowls and we knew Wilson had seen the same two, so can only assume that his memory was faulty and he got an amethyst bowl mixed up with a green one. At this time a few more have

come out of hiding. We have seen at least three in marigold and at least three amethyst.

The first time we saw this green set was at Ray Wishard's home in Pennsylvania. We and a few other collectors stopped in to visit on the way to the 1972 ICGA convention in Rochester, New York. We had stopped at Lucille Lowe's, Killbuck, Ohio, on the way. Lucille told us that she had just sold a green curved in punch set in MultiFruits and Flowers to Wishard for \$850. When we got the Wishard's home and saw it, we really drooled over it as it was clearly the best one of these that we had ever seen in either shape.

We had to wait until gigantic Wishard auction in Louisville, Kentucky, spread over three days in March, 1977, before having a chance at this set. On and on the auction went (there were over 1200 lots) before, finally, coming to Lot 762. Millersburg Multifruits punch set, green. No special note in the catalog called attention to its rare shape or iridescence. This was the one thing in the whole auction that Jack was determined he was going after. What a pleasant surprise to have everyone else drop out after reaching \$750! We did have to pay sales tax on it. Maybe we were fortunate that there were so many other rarities for collectors to focus on. Maybe we were the only ones to treasure this item.

Not long after that, we saw the blue rosebowl shaped set, with beautiful radium iridescence. The owners did not have any other significant carnival glass. They said the set had been in the family a long time. However, they were willing to put a price on it--\$10,000. At the time, this seemed an outrageous price and an indication they really did not want to sell. Now, of course, now it's another time and that price no longer seems outrageous.

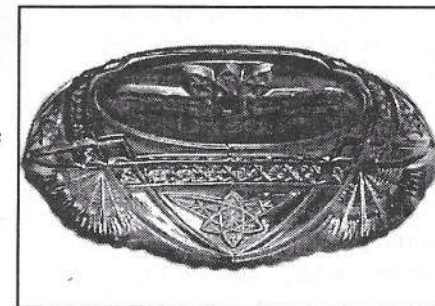

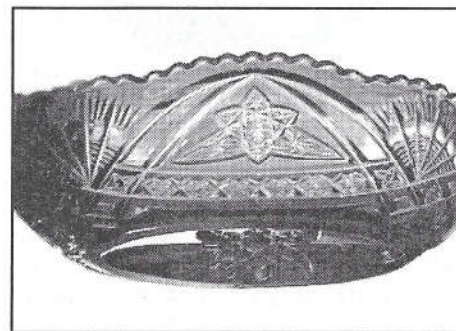
The Mysterious Curved Star

*The third in a series on non USA Carnival

We'd like to begin this article by telling you a tale that happened one crisp, cold day in Sweden. Despite being early Spring, there was snow on the ground and all the lakes in the region were frozen solid, giving the scene a fairy tale quality. Muffled up with gloves and scarves, we trudged into a little antique fair and immediately came upon a stall bearing several Carnival items. Strange how the thrill of seeing unusual and beautiful Carnival Glass can warm even the coldest of frost bitten fingers and toes. We seized upon a dish that was about five inches long. The pattern was familiar - the color was not. It was a Curved Star piece in an oval shape that we had not seen before. There was something unusual about the pattern too, but the biggest surprise of all was the fact that it had a rich purple base color. What a fantastic iridescence it had too - shimmering with lime green, pink and turquoise, much like the

fabulous multi-doped effect that Imperial's purple can have.

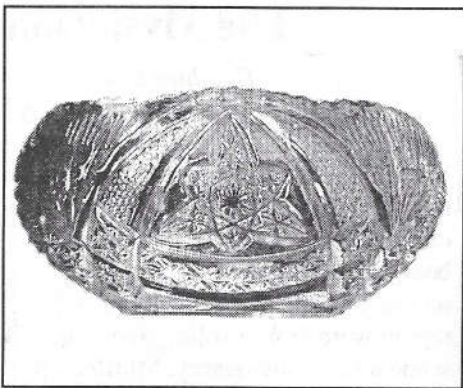
Of course, we bought it and carried it home as if it was the Crown Jewels. I swear it didn't leave our sides for a moment. For this was the first piece of Curved Star reported in purple, to our knowledge, and it was to prove critical in helping us to sort out the mystery of who made what!

We had been puzzling over the two manufacturers that conventional wisdom accredited with making the Curved Star pattern - Brockwitz in Germany and Eda Glasbruks in Sweden - for some time. We'd studied the bases, the shapes, the sizes and we had a few theories, but nothing concrete. The discovery of the oval dish was a landmark, for its distinctive deep purple color meant that it must surely be an Eda product. Brockwitz Carnival is

known in marigold and blue only, while Eda is known to have made several shades of purple.

There was also something very unusual about the detail within the pattern on the purple Eda dish – there is no cross hatched file on the claw shapes. So, we studied every piece of Curved Star we could lay our hands on – we got out our magnifying glass and went through all the archive and catalog pages we had - and our final conclusion was that if an example of Curved Star has file on the claws, then it is a Brockwitz piece. If there is no file, it is Scandinavian and made by Eda (there are also a few examples by a Finnish factory called Karhula-Iittala).

The Brockwitz output of Curved Star was huge. They made a phenomenal range of shapes and sizes that never fail to impress. Eda's production of the pattern was very much smaller. But what they lacked in quantity, they certainly made up for in quality - our little purple dish is a true Star.

Carnival Glass – Northwood

Harry Northwood came to America from England, in 1885, where his family was well established in the Glass industry. He started his American career at the Hobbs, Brockunier, and Company of West Virginia. In 1902 he purchased this company and started the "Harry Northwood Glass Co.". Many of the best known patterns in custard and clear pressed glass came from his factory. By 1910 they were busy making and advertising iridescent glass. The Northwood Glass Co. produced some of the best known Carnival Glass pieces, in many different patterns and colors, in various sizes, and shapes between 1910 and 1918. Harry Northwood died in 1919, and the company ceased operation in 1925.

Of the glass companies that originally produced carnival glass Northwood was the only company that marked much of their production. Their trademark, was the N within a circle; in most cases the N was also underlined. In the mid 70's, the trademark was used on an Ice Blue and pale Amber Grape & Cable butter dish, nut bowl, and rosebowl. At the time the trademark belonged to the American Carnival Glass Association (ACGA). They took legal action to stop it from being used on other reproductions. Northwood did not make these pieces in either color. In the 1970/80's The L.G. Wright Company used a modified version of the Northwood mark on some of its production. The mark had a line, at an angle, coming off the front leg of the N, it was said to be a W.

The Grape & Cable is the pattern every one associates with Northwood. They produced at least 50 different items in the pattern, the largest of which is the majestic Master Punch Set. Almost every color known in carnival glass was made at one time or another, in one shape or another, in one or more patterns, by this company. The exception is the Red color; the company closed prior to the Red carnival glass production era. Most of their production was in the usual Carnival Glass colors of Amethyst/Purple, Blue, Green, and Marigold. Their pastel colors of Aqua Opal, Ice Blue, Ice Green, and White are some of the more expensive and sought after pieces by the carnival glass collector today. They also made items in about 20 other colors, all of which would be considered from rare to scarce. Two companies, Fenton & Dugan/Diamond made many pieces in Peach Opal (French Opal w/marigold iridescence), but only 4 pieces are known to be made by Northwood.

Northwood's aqua opal is the most collectable carnival glass color on today's market. They produced about 75 percent of the Aqua Opal color and most all of the Ice Blue and Ice Green pieces. The only known Aqua Opal

Grape & Cable small size Punch Set sold for a reportedly \$95,000.00 about 2 years ago.

Some of the most collectable Northwood patterns are; Acorn Burr, Bushel Baskets, Corn Vases, Embroidered Mums, Good Luck, Grape & Cable, Greek Key, Hearts & Flowers, Memphis, Nippon, Peacock at the Fountain, Peacock on the Fence (Peacocks), Poppy Show, Rose Show, Singing Birds, Spring Time, Strawberry(stippled), Three Fruits(stippled), Tornado vases, Tree Trunk vases (all three sizes), and Wishbone.

The Hospitality room was open at various times with Lee and Shirley Stonebraker in charge. We had a lot of food donated by so many of you. We thank you for your generosity.

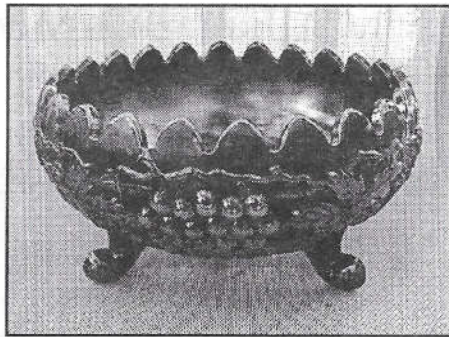

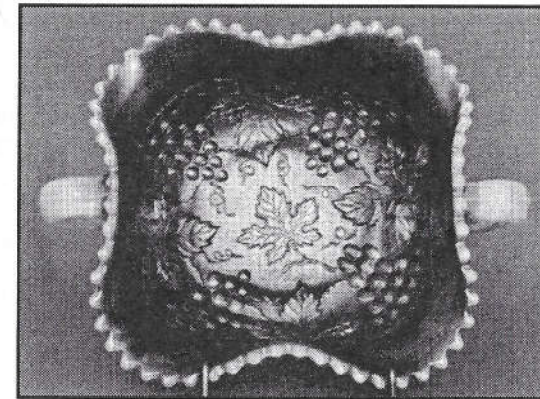

HOTEL - Embassy Suites Hotel, 7640 N.W. Tiffany Springs Parkway, Kansas City, Missouri (At the Kansas City International Airport). Reservations can be made by calling the Hotel directly at 816-891-7788, between the hours of 7:00 A.M. & 7:00 P.M. on weekdays. Ask for reservations, and mention the HOACGA convention. Other times reservations can be made by calling 1-800-EMBASSY (1-800-362-2779). The FAX No. at the hotel is 816- 891-0630.. If you will need a table(s), (6 ft) for your display or for selling glass, please request it when making your reservations. The table rental charge is \$15.00 per table, for the duration of the convention. Shuttle service is available from the Airport, use the courtesy phone and call the Embassy Suites.

HOTEL RESERVATIONS

ROOM RATES: The rate for all suites, except suites 219 thru 226, is \$98.00 per day for single or double occupancy. For three or four occupancy, the rate is \$108.00 per day. The rate for suites 219 thru 226 is \$108.00 per day. The room rate includes a free cooked-to-order breakfast, and a manager's reception each evening, from 6 to 8:00 P.M.

This is the first year the Hotel has assessed a charge for the meeting rooms, it is predicated on the total number of rooms occupied during the convention. So, even if you are only staying Friday night for the Saturday auction, please make your reservations at the Embassy Suites.

One Hundred and Fifty (150) rooms have been blocked at the reduced rate, but the block is only good until April 10, 2001. If you are thinking of attending, please make your reservation; they can always be canceled. Make your reservations on or before April 10. After that date the rooms will be at their regular rate, and a room may or may not be available. 2002 HOACGA Souvenir

by Bob Grissom

The HOACGA “Good Luck” hatpin holder was made in 1977 in a “Flame Red” color and again in 1980 in “Ice Green”. Last year Frank Fenton made the hatpin holder in Vaseline Opalescent. They experienced much difficulty in its production, after working for at least 4 turns they were able to get 215 good pieces for the club.

This year they were making Emerald Green glass and we asked Frank to make the Hatpin Holder in this color. Of course Frank always likes a challenge, so he said he would. He called after they had worked for one turn and said that they had only gotten 97 good pieces because they had again experienced some problems, the feet were cracking. He had gotten the experts together and they resolved the problem. They had to make some changes to the mold and would try again on Monday. So they assigned one of the more experienced glass crew workers to the job on Monday. Frank said they had some difficulty at the start of the turn, but they soon resolved the problems. So, once they started they wanted to make sure they made enough for our order, the result of this turn of work was 195 good pieces.

I firmly believe that Frank Fenton goes to all of this effort because he wants to provide a good piece of glass for the collectors. We appreciate Frank's effort in making the souvenirs.

The Room Display award, the “Hobnail” spittoon will also be Emerald Green.
