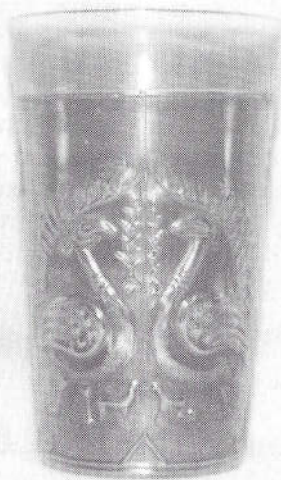

MIRRORED PEACOCKS

"Mirrored Peacocks" is a very pretty and rather unusual tumbler. It was made with somewhat thinner glass than most carnival glass tumblers. It is also a little taller than the average size carnival glass tumbler. "Mirrored Peacocks" was probably made in Czechoslovakia or Finland or some other country in that area. In addition to the peacocks, a number of small ram like animal figures extend around the bottom part of the tumbler. The color is a good deep marigold. I have seen only four of these tumblers, so I believe I would be safe in stating that they are quite rare.

The credit for naming this pattern goes to Jody Mitchell. She located and researched these tumblers while living in the Houston, Texas area. She later moved with her family to Oregon and is still collecting carnival glass.

I consider "Mirrored Peacocks" to be a very fine tumbler. It adds pattern variety and color to the tumbler collection. Unfortunately, it is so scarce that only a very few tumbler collectors will ever be able to own one. Keep looking however, as one might show up sometime in your favorite flea market at a very modest price.

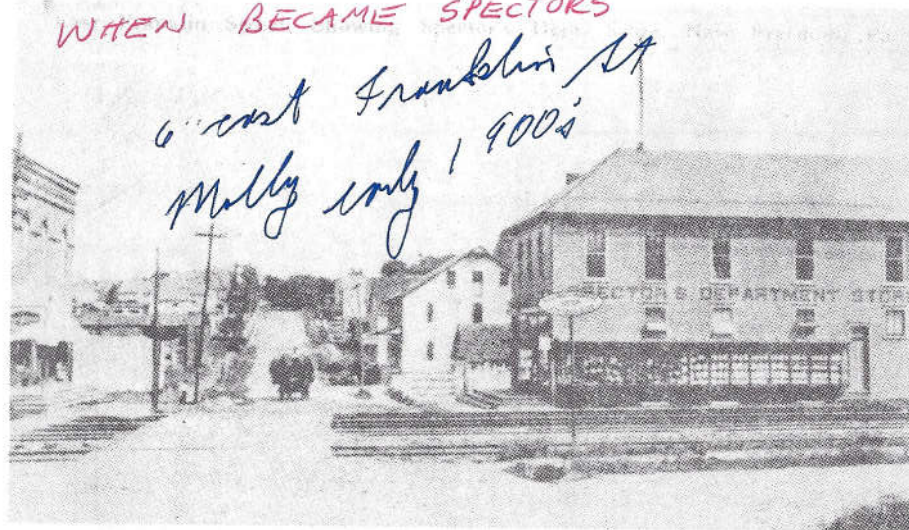
SPECTOR'S PLATE ADDRESS ?
